While on assignment in Seattle, Washington, I had the extremely fortunate opportunity to tour the Boeing aircraft manufacturing facility. My tour guide was a longtime Boeing engineer and friend of mine.

Touring the entire Boeing plant is impossible to do at one time. You would probably need one full week. There are basically two main plant locations. The first one, in Everett, just north of Seattle, manufactures the 767, the 777 and the new 747-8. The second facility, in Renton, is just south of the city. It makes the whole line of 737s--currently 31 airplanes a month.

Boeing Field, between the two plants, serves as a maintenance/testing hub for the company and for other types of airplanes. Boeing's Museum of Flight is also located there. The flight line, as seen above, is the most impressive. It looks

like a new car lot. There are so many 747-8s and 787s that one runway at Paine Field (Everett) had to be shut down for storage of the extra jets. Most of the jets are in their final stages of completion and may or may not be already painted.

Test flights are made every day, including weekends! We saw what looked to be the inaugural flight of a Cathay Pacific cargo 747-8. Those test flights can last anywhere from one to nine hours.

Whether it's whole planes, pieces of planes or stressed, beat-up old testbeds, you've got it all at the Boeing facility, but glimpsing one shiny jet is just like looking at a new toy. A \$319 million toy!

If you ever get an opportunity to visit Seattle, after you've done the "Space Needle," you can't forget Boeing. The museums are great, and the company is amazing. Who knows, you just might see something special.

The *United States Air Force Museum* in Dayton, Ohio is known worldwide for its collection of everything current and vintage

Once you enter the museum, the bookstore and exhibits are on your righthand side. The Imax and outside displays are to the

left and straight ahead. To get in and out of the museum, you must go through the store. Ah, very smart...

First, the museum, including the Presidential tour, will take you over eight hours to get through. That's if you don't read most of what you see and don't take tons of pictures. With pics and reading, tack on one and a half days total time. The bookstore adds another one to two hours.

Plan on two full days to visit this museum in Dayton. It's worth the time--heck, you won't even realize time is actually passing.

P.S.-Eat lunch somewhere else.









The Review Corner



The World's Worst Aircraft



UK author Jim Winchester has published several authoritative aviation books, but he has taken a little bit of a humorous twist on his literary road with this offering. As Jim points out in the book's Introduction, the

150 aircraft featured between its covers are his own choice, and while there could be arguments both pro and con on his selections, a number of them should be considered more as "flops" than "worst." Various factors affected many aircraft--a poor choice of power plants, an idea that wasn't borne out in practice, or simply a case of the design's being obsolete before it was produced.

He notes that all of the aircraft in his book were--at one time--"labors of love" representing someone's dream, and all cost a good chunk of money. Some of them cost people their careers and large fortunes as well, and he respectfully doesn't take cheap shots at anyone who's tried and failed.



Being a fan of lesser-known aircraft, I love this book

because a lot of the birds contained in it are actually favorites of mine, which (in my skewed thinking) are actually pretty cool machines. But I like Winchester's tongue-in-cheek sidebars in each chapter. On the Fisher P-75 Eagle, he notes, "The bright idea of making a new craft out of pieces from various other aero planes was doomed from the start. What resulted was a machine that looked awful and flew even worse." Well, I don't know about that. I kinda thought the Eagle was a pretty neat aircraft. And I've got the Valom kit of it on my short list of projects too.

The huge 1928 Beardmore Inflexible was described this way: "Although it was incapable of serving any useful role, it could at least fly." He also notes that a related design, the Beardmore Inverness, was "an all-metal flying boat whose creators had such faith in its airworthiness that it was equipped with two large masts and sails to get it home in the event of a forced water landing." Of the sleek and good-looking Hughes XF-11, the author states, "Howard Hughes' XF-11 nearly cost him his life. Some say it cost him his sanity."

And of Supermarine's Swift, "It had a tendency to pitch and flip over without warning ... one Rolls-Royce test pilot, who flew more than 80 types, reported that it was the only one that flew him, instead of the other way around." Besides the good humor leveled at the 150 entries in Winchester's book, a lot of history is in there as well, much of it new to me. There are two full pages devoted to each aircraft as well as photographs and full-color artwork of them.

Initially, I thought this book would be just a good read, but I was pleasantly surprised at the amount of reference material in it, particularly the photographs showing details that I can use when I get around to building models of the birds that interest me. This is a good book, so don't let its name deter you from buying it---and in fact, it might be found on the bargain book shelf at Barnes & Noble.
