The Canadian Snowbirds



If you want a real treat and have had more than your usual helping of Blue Angels and Thunderbirds, then just slip over the Canadian border for a real nice airshow respite. Of course, I'm talking about the Canadian Snowbirds.

Other airshow performers fly only six planes at one time...the Snowbirds fly nine planes all at once. With other performers, exciting as they are, there are awkward breaks in the action as the jets jockey around to set up for their next maneuver. With the Snowbirds, there's always something going on, and it's alway exciting! Your head is swiveling.

First, you can't believe that so many planes in close formation can maneuver about without bumping into one another. Second, the way each jet holds its own station is truly amazing. It is pretty obvious when nine jets wobble their wings.

You just hope that they know what they're doing. And of course they do--that's why they are one of the best airshow performance teams in the world...and that's a real short list.

Their jets, CT-114 Tudors, have no afterburner but make up for the lack of noise with sheer flying skill. It's like watching a delicate, three-dimensional ballet being played out above your head. The Tudor has been around for awhile, so I like the way the Snowbirds contrast the old with the new by flying alongside an F-18 Hornet or an F-86 Sabre.

Each pilot will eventually go back to his or her F-18 fighter squadron, but this kind of flying has to be a real kick for them.

It's almost like flying a bi-plane, super fun and maneuverable at low speeds. If they're ever performing nearby, do yourself a favor and see the Canadian Snowbirds.





My latest service call came from fellow club member Hector. He has an Iwata Eclipse HP-CS double action top feeder airbrush. Hector called me up to asked my advice on a problem he's having with his airbrush. The problem

is, when he tries to paint something, no paint comes out of the airbrush and the paint cap flies off the airbrush. I asked him if he had he cleaned it, and his answer was, "Yes, all the way." So after a few more questions, I determined that I needed to see this airbrush for myself. We agreed to meet at the Downers Grove Hooters, where we have our meeting after the meeting every month and it's easy to get to for both of us. So between eating snow crab legs and hot wings, I took a look at Hector's airbrush.

I unscrewed the needle nap and nozzle cap and all looked OK.
There's a little paint in the nozzle nap. A little cleaning will take care
of that. I can't unscrew the head cap and I don't have my kit with
me, so I move on. I remove the handle and find the needle



chucking guide is loose, as is the needle chucking nut. I pull out the needle to inspect it. The needle is fine, so I tighten the needle chucking guide, insert the needle and tighten the needle chucking nut. I then reassemble the nozzle cap and needle cap. At this point I discover the needle is sticking out way too far. (See picture 1.) I showed



Hector what I found and told him that I would take his brush with me for further examination. So we finished up our wings and legs.

Back at my lab (workbench) and armed with my official Iwata airbrush wrench, I was now able to take off the head cap. Now before I tell you what the problem is, take a look at photo 2 and see if you can spot what's wrong with this picture. Do you see it? Well, for those of you didn't see the problem, Hector didn't reinstall the nozzle! That's right, the nozzle that presses into the body of the airbrush and is held in place by the head cap. (See photo 3.) After I replaced the nozzle, the airbrush worked just fine.

So how do we keep from making these kinds of mistakes? What I

do is always draw a diagram of how I take the airbrush apart. I keep the parts in a safe place where I can't spill them on the floor (don't ask me how I know this--I hate carpet

diving!). I also number the parts on my drawing and in the container that I keep the parts in. This way, I always get the parts back in and in the right order.

Although this was not an OMG fix, I hope you got a laugh out of it like we did. This is a more common problem than you may think--even us pros forget to put a part in from time to time. So when you're cleaning your airbrush, take your time and work in a flat, well-lit work area. Make a diagram and number your parts and you won't have the same problem Hector had, but then you would have missed out on the wings and snow crab legs!

The Review Corner



THE GUN

By C.J. CHIVERS


The author, C.J. Chivers, comes from a strong military background. He was a captain in the U.S. Marine Corps who participated in the first Iraq War, known as "Desert Storm." He became an award-winning reporter after the war. Assisting him is a fellow marine who serves as his photographer.

"The Gun" is a compilation of anecdotal occurrences taken from historical fact that trace the invention and role of the assault weapon in modern war. Ultimately, this trail leads to what Chivers really wants to talk about, and that is the **AK-47**. Known as "the people's gun," the AK-47 was actually the product of the former Soviet Union or more specifically, an army sergeant named Mikhail T. Kalashnikov.

The first half of the book is dedicated to lessons learned and not learned by countries that embraced this new weapon and by those that refused to recognize the significance of the machine gun. It details how this weapon eventually became the modern "assault weapon." The assault weapon is the missing link between the submachine gun, which fires pistol ammunition, and the full machine gun, which is belt fed and not easy to move, usually resting on a tripod. These bigger guns fire the larger .30 cal or .50 cal ammunition.

The second half of the book deals with how the Russians got a 15-year jump on the Americans to develop the best assault weapon around. The Pentagon laughed at this crude weapon in 1961 and was unimpressed, but behind the walls many were very worried. America's first answer was the M-14. This heavy, large caliber rifle was unwieldy and hard to control in the field, especially in jungle environments like Vietnam. It was the perfect "dinosaur." Soon the rush was on to compete with the AK-47 in Southeast Asia. The AR-15 (M-16) was hurriedly developed and sent to Vietnam even though the Pentagon knew about its many problems, including mass stoppages and mismatched ammunition.

Today, the modern assault weapon comes in many varieties and loads, but the AK-47 is still the king. It's the weapon of choice for insurgents, dictators, terrorists, gunrunners and child soldiers. This book is neither pro- nor anti-gun. It only illuminates that one well-developed weapon can have worldwide implications. In fact, Chiver found an AK in Afghanistan that was manufactured in 1954 and was still in perfect working order. Now I call that a great weapon, and this is a great book.




