First Responder 'In The House'



When you enter the Pacific Coast Air Museum in Santa Rosa, Calif., the first thing you will see is F-15 #77-0102, the first fighter to appear over New York City on 9/11. Scrambled out of Otis Air Force Base in Massachusetts, this 101st Fighter Squadron jet rolled in at supersonic speed, representing a show of strength for all New Yorkers to see.

How did a far-flung Western aviation museum obtain such an aircraft on permanent loan from the United States Air Force? Connections, the drier air, and maybe just the plain fact that the Pacific Coast Air Museum has a giant reputation in the air museum industry. The military, in fact, suggested the California museum as the perfect home for this special bird.

I can see their point. All of the museum's airplanes are in pristine condition. There is no rust in this perpetually dry air, and no one but veterans are allowed to wrench on the planes.

Pictures of the opening ceremony last year show that the handover was a red carpet event, including both F-15 pilots who made the trip over New York that day, and an interpretive exhibit is being designed about the plane's role on Sept. 11, 2001.

If you visit this museum, you will not be disappointed. The staff is knowledgable and friendly and really cares about what they do.


## Revell's New 'Mongoose' Rail Dragster

Tom "The Mongoose" McEwen was a very popular racer who forever changed drag racing. McEwen raced mainly in the Southern California racetracks in the 1960s. He brought many firsts to drag racing, including the rear mounted engine (1965 Plymouth Barracuda Funny Car), the slider clutch


technique (developed by reducing the spring pressures in the clutches), and the introduction of sponsors outside the typical automotive industries (Mattel's, Hot Wheels brand) to drag racing.

These changes, as well as many others, impacted the way cars shot down the quarter-mile strips and forever altered the landscape of drag racing. McEwen received his nickname, "The Mongoose," because of the much heralded




rivalry between Don "The Snake" Prudhomme and himself. This pairing would become one of the best known and talked-about pairings in the history of drag racing. The two are still talked as you watch the rockets nowadays sizzle down the quarter-mile rails at over 300 miles an hour. Though McEwen may not have been one of the most successful racers in history (winning only five NHRA events in his 35-plus-year career), he became one of the more beloved due to his outspoken nature and his ability to bring attention to his sport.

Revell has reissued the original Monogram RE Mongoose kit #7529 from 1973. The new kit is Revell kit #4908, Tom "The Mongoose" McEwen Rail Dragster. The newly reissued kit is boxed almost




exactly like the original except that the original decals have been changed. (If you are interested in the original decals, you can contact Chuck Boerner at 317-703-8923, found on a link from modelcarsmag.com forum.) In addition, the Goodyear raised letter tires are now flat with decal lettering (the ever so common licensing issue). The detail and extras included in this kit are amazing, considering it is as old as I am. Below is a picture of the original decal sheet from the Tom McEwen/ Don Prudhomme dragster set.

Two trees molded in white plastic are included in this kit, along with a white molded dragster frame, one very small clear tree, one chromed plastic tree, and three soft plastic trees (two are for the tires, and the other includes the plumbing extras). In the kit that I received, there was some problem with the very tiny front tires. The molding did not finish and they were deformed. Luckily Revell has one of the most hassle-free missing/damaged part(s) request forms on their website. They are typically very prompt on



getting parts correctly into your hands and have always been very pleasant to deal with.

Remarkable extras included in the kit are a set of older-style starting/Christmas tree lights, a driver and a standing/ear-grasping crewman, flexible plastic ignition wires, flexible plastic oil cooler lines with filters, and flexible plastic fuel lines! It is incredible to think that 39 years ago kits



included extras like plumbing for a dragster!
The decals, though not the original decals, are very clear and colorful. They are "Fly Navy" decals and will really add something special to this kit.

I could find no flash on any of the hard plastic trees. The only flash found was on the flexible plastic parts. This was very minimal and will be easily cleaned up with a sharp blade. There was only one small windscreen, made of clear plastic, which is to be expected for a dragster. The

chromed parts looked incredible. The entire kit looks to fall together with very little effort, and it appears that even I would have no problems making this kit into a superstar.

The instructions include a detailed part list, which seems to be Revell's norm on newer kits. This is a welcome addition since knowing what each part is, as you assemble the kit, helps to clarify any confusion in the assembly instruction. For the assembly instruction diagrams, the part number is the only identifier because only the part names are used in the beginning section of the instructions.

The assembly instructions are well illustrated and clear. The only discrepancy I could see



was that the firing order is incorrect for the ignition wires. Unless one is a "rivet counter," I'm sure this will not be noticed. A mere 13 steps creates a very grand rendition of this dragster. I really look forward to building this kit and displaying it in a spot of honor in the display case.




### Capillary Action Can Be Your Friend


We've all experienced the oopsie of having liquid glue run between a model part and our fingers due to the capillary action there. That's always a real oh-shucky-darn, ain't it?

Some years ago, I had a couple of friends who didn't own airbrushes but who achieved super paint jobs on their models. Since I can't brushpaint for beans, I asked one of them, Don Grajek, just how he got such beautiful results. He gave a demo to the McKinstry chapter on his technique, which seemed pretty innovative to me--basically using that same principle of capillary action to make sharp demarcation lines between colors.



Don demonstrated this on a Spitfire model. Using a single-edged razor blade, he made two parallel

circumferential cuts about a half-inch apart in the plastic around the aft fuselage, then applied a fairly heavy coat of "Sky"-colored Humbrol enamel (his choice of paints) to the area between them. The stuff flowed out to the "cut lines" and no farther . . . the lines stopped it like small dams. When that was dry, he applied a fuselage color to the area outside the lines--it flowed right up to the first color and stopped, just slick as a whistle. I couldn't have masked and sprayed a tighter line.




That's been 40 years ago, and with all my modeling "practice," I still can't brush-paint. Cripes, if I didn't have my airbrush, I'd probably have to give up modeling. But I use Don's technique for the small places where I do have to break down and apply paint with a brush. Some examples are making cuts around the console "panels" of a cockpit tub (Photo #1), where I'll spray the tub one color and then brush-paint the consoles black. Sure enough, it makes a nice sharp color line.

Another example is under the hoods of car models where there's molded-in detail like voltage regulators and other "boxes" on the firewall, or like Photo #2, the windshield washer bag.

When I built the 2002 Camaro kit, I cut a line around the periphery of the windows and roof so that when I applied black paint to it, I got a nice sharp line of black against the red of the car (Photos #3 and #4).

This technique works really nicely on aircraft gear legs. Making a small line around them means that a wash you put on the struts will pop them out like crazy.

## In Remembrance



## Charles E. Metz, Ph.D.

September 11, 1942 - July 4, 2012

CHARLES E. METZ earned his B.A. in physics from Bowdoin College in 1964 and his Ph.D. in radiological physics from the University of Pennsylvania in 1969. Joining the Department of Radiology at The University of Chicago as Instructor immediately thereafter, Dr. Metz was promoted to Assistant Professor in 1971, to Associate Professor in 1976 and to Professor in 1980.


His research interests include various applications of signal detection theory and systems analysis in medical imaging, with emphasis on image reconstruction from projections and the development of receiver operating characteristic (ROC) methodology for quantitative evaluation of diagnostic performance.

Dr. Metz is the author or a co-author of more than 250 scientific publications, and ROC software developed by his group is now used by more than 10,000 investigators around the world. In 1995 and again in 2008, Dr. Metz received the annual Kurt Rossmann Award for Excellence in Teaching by vote of students in The University of Chicago's Graduate Programs in Medical Physics (now Committee on Medical Physics).

He was elected as a Fellow of The American Association of Physicists in Medicine in 2004, received the Paul C. Hodges Alumni Society's Excellence Award in 2004, and was awarded the 12th L.H. Gray Medal by the International Commission on Radiation Units and Measurements in September 2005.

Dr. Metz's biography is included in a variety of published listings, including Marquis Who's Who in America and Marquis Who's Who in the World.
