WWII in Rome, Italy 1943





Until now, I thought I knew just about everything about World War II, but on a recent trip to Rome, Italy, I discovered that I was wrong. For one thing, I knew about Nazi internment and murder of millions of Jews, Gypsies and "enemies of the state," but I did not know what happened on October 16, 1943, in a small section of the city called "The Jewish Ghetto."

Days after the Americans invaded the Italian mainland, the Germans started a hasty retreat north. During this mass exodus, the Nazis rounded up every Jewish family in Rome they could find, and then transported them to concentration camps (mainly Auschwitz). Jews who were in hiding avoided this fate, but others were not so lucky. Being cordoned off in a

small area of the city made it relatively easy to find these families. Families were grabbed up in 24 hours, and placed on trains to meet their doomed fate.

A local shop owner in Rome was nice enough to explain these events to me. He also told me that if I walked in the area, I would find bronze bricks with the names of the dead inscribed on them. They would be at the foot of each door where families were taken from the building.

Today, the neighborhood looks the same as it did in 1943, until you look REALLY close. Then you see what many unknowingly walk right over every day. Once you know, it's hard not to see. For most of us, modeling involves history. This is definitely a history lesson.

GLOSS FINISHES

WITH AN EMPHASIS ON AIRLINER MODELS



Depending on the temperature, humidity, and thinner ratio, some gloss paints may dry with a slight dull finish.

Once again, 3M Finesse-It II comes to the rescue. Rub out the paint with a little 3M on a damp cotton ball, and the resulting gloss will amaze you. Note that this stuff is also great to clean up bits of adhesive or little irregularities like tape ridge lines in the final finish – I have saved several models



from a complete "re-do" thanks to this stuff. One final note on the 3M polish – the initial cost is high, around \$40-\$50 per quart. The good news is that it will last a long time. I bought a quart 15 years ago, and I still have half a container left.



Photos 10 and 11 show a 707 and a DC-6 with final gloss white paint coats. The next step is masking off and spraying additional color/ NMF areas. Lacquer paint is durable, and generally can take masking tape without ill effects such as paint pullup. However, I try not to leave the tape on too



long. Generally, I use 3M Scotch electrical tape (photo 12) for masking. It is thin, flexible, and leaves a crisp edge. The 3M tape comes in assorted colors, but I find the orange provides the best contrast against most aircraft base colors, from light to dark. Home Depot carries the 3M tape – around \$3-\$4 a roll.

I usually lower the tack of the tape by pressing the tape on my jeans before cutting and applying to the model. Note: Do not use cheap electrical tape – the adhesive is "mushy" and will bleed when used to mask around curves. In **photo 13**, the engine areas of a Delta Connie have been sprayed dark blue (lacquer) and the orange 3M electrical tape masks are being removed.

Photo 14 shows another Connie sprayed gloss white, with the upper fuselage taped off, ready for NMF airbrushing. Note that Press-N-Seal has been used as a fill-in mask (over and above the 3M tape) for the

upper fuselage. **Photo 15** shows a DC-6 after spraying NMF over the wings and lower body, with the masking removed.


Some General Painting Notes:

Many modelers believe that a great model finish requires an expensive double action airbrush. **Photo 16** shows my 44-year-old Badger 200 single action brush. It still works and still produces great gloss finishes. Yes, over the years I have acquired two double action Badger airbrushes, but the "200" is my absolute

favorite and used for 99 percent of my spraying.

In the photo, you may notice that I have adapted a Testors ¼-ounce jar cap to fit on my Badger, thus allowing me to use ¼-ounce Testors jars for spraying. Larger jars (1 to 2 ounces- are used for paint mixing/matching. Once I get the color mix just right, the jar is labeled and a little of the paint is poured





off into a ¼ ounce jar (about 1/3 to 1/4 full). Then I fill the rest of the ¼-ounce jar with lacquer thinner, and spray right from the jar.

Adding thinner is a little bit of a trial and error effort, but I try to get the paint to the consistency of milk. I am using Rust-oleum medium dry lacquer thinner (**photo 17**), but any slow- to medium-dry lacquer thinner should work. Less expensive brands like Sunnyside (**photo 18**) are great for cleaning, but most of

these products are fast drying, and tend to leave a bit of a rough finish when used with paint. I have had success with both thinners - here again, a little experimentation and practice are the steps needed to get the right mix of paint/ thinner.



I spray at 10-15 pounds pressure, wearing a paint mask, and using a small exhaust fan (photo 19). I try

to put on a very light coat at first – almost dry as it hits the kit. Then I will go back with the air brush a little closer to the model and put on a wet coat – wet but not runny. For example, I will start on the bottom of a kit with the light coat, then do the top, and then go back to the bottom to start the wet coat. Note that nothing takes the place of practice....do some test work on an old model to see how the paint lays down. You may have to go back and adjust the amount of thinner, air pressure or distance from the model – practice, practice, practice!



Lacquer paints are great – easy to spray, fast drying (30-60 minutes), and extremely durable. I bought the following basic colors in pint cans 38 years ago: black, brown, green, red, yellow, blue, white and clear. I am still using the same pint cans of paint today – this stuff goes a long, long way and does not go bad (see **photos 20** and **21**).



White is the most used color, both for final coats and mixing. For natural metal, I mix clear lacquer with an antiquing paint (Silver Leaf) that can be found in craft or art stores (see **photo 22**). Silver Leaf comes in a small 1-ounce square bottle, with instructions on the label stating, "do not spray." However, I do spray it, using the exhaust fan and respirator, and the following mix: about 5 parts clear to 1 part Silver Leaf, and then thinned down. This mix has to be sprayed on as a light mist. Again, this needs a little experimenting to get the right result (see **photo 23**).





or blue, or brass paint. I generally use lacquers to "tint," but have also used Testors enamels. The tinted mix can be used to highlight panels, control surfaces, exhaust areas, etc. Other types of paint (enamels, acrylics, etc.) can be sprayed



over the NMF with no fear of attacking the underlying finish.



Once all of the painting is completed, decaling can begin. Since the NMF is glossy, decaling is a snap. I set decals in Future – brushing a wet coat of Future where the decal is to be placed, and then sliding the decal into the Future. Remove the excess Future with a damp paper towel and let the decal dry. After the decal has dried, clean up any Future residue around the decal with a Q-tip dipped in Windex. After cleanup the decal looks painted on, so in many cases, no clear topcoat is needed to "blend" the decals and the model finish. No clear topcoat means one less trip to the paint shop and one less chance for a costly accident. If you need a clear coat, use gloss clear lacquer or Testors Dullcoat flat, or a 50/50 mix. Note that this takes a little care – too wet a coat will distort decals. (I had one real bad experience with this, and at that point, it is time to start a new

model.) I have never tried using Future to seal the decals, but I am sure it would work – the underlying lacquer will be impervious, and there is no risk of distorting the decals.

After the decals, it is time for the "fiddly" bits such as antennas, lights, etc. In most cases, a vacformed canopy is the last item to be attached, but that is another story.


Embroidered or digitally printed apparel with both color and black-and white logos is available to be delivered to your door. Women's styles are also available. Non-members are welcomed.



Sharks of the Air

By James Neal Harvey

The subtitle of Harvey's work is "The Story Of Willy Messerschmitt and the Development of History's First Operational Jet Fighter" – and I was prepared to read all about the Me-262.

What a pleasant surprise to find that Harvey has made a capsule of virtually the entire war in Europe, with Messerschmitt as the central figure. All the players are there – Goering, Milch, Hitler, Speer, Eaker, Doolittle, Harris, Galland, etc. – and the daring (as well as the absurdity) of some actions taken before and during the war are woven together into an absolutely GREAT read.

The relationships among all the characters are treated completely and truthfully, and even if you're not an aircraft enthusiast, you'll be spellbound with the wealth of stories Harvey has amassed. It's a near-perfect blend of career biographies and gripping military history.

Willy Messerschmitt believed all along that he was helping the Fatherland in its war efforts, though he never joined the Nazi party, but he realized too late that Adolf Hitler was a madman who was shortsighted and failed to realize the importance and potential of this superb aircraft. Hitler was always bent on revenge and thus decreed that the Me-262 be equipped as a bomber to pulverize his enemies in retaliation. Had he listened instead to Messerschmitt, Galland and Steinhoff, trying to persuade him (and Goering) that the aircraft was so far ahead of any other fighter in the world, and had it been produced in numbers, the war might have had an entirely different outcome.

The author is a pilot, and the flying and aviation history portions of the book are without equal in terms of accuracy and being able to put the reader into the cockpit. The technical aspects of the development of the aircraft are treated in-depth, as well as air-to-air encounters.

What a great book. Can't recommend this one highly enough. I got mine from the Military Book Club as part of one of their "buy one book – get another for free" promotions. A superb read.

Reel Time Movies Reviews

My Way

In the aftermath of the Normandy invasion, Allied forces captured a German soldier. While trying to interrogate him, they were unable to understand his language. For you see, this "German" soldier was actually Korean.

Inspired by true events, "My Way" is a movie from the renowned South Korean director Je-Kyu Kang, who also directed the critically acclaimed "Tae Guk Gi - The Brotherhood of War." It tells the story of two boyhood friends who - over the span of some 25 years - became rivals in the world of long-distance running, then superior and subordinate, and finally equals.

The movie begins in 1928 with the Japanese occupation of Korea and introduces us to Jun-shik Kim, a young Korean boy whose father is the caretaker for the local Japanese official. His life is changed forever on the day the governor's grandson, Hasegawa Tatsuo, arrives from



Tokyo. The two boys discover they share a bond in the simple act of running. This bond carries them through their teen years as they compete against each other in running, culminating in the Olympic trials for the right to represent Japan in the 1940 Olympics. As an occupied territory, Korea was not allowed to send a team to the Olympics but had to be part of the Japanese team. Jun-shik Kim is the clear winner of the race, but in an act of pure racism, he is disqualified and the victory is awarded to Tatsuo. With racial tensions already high, a riot breaks out. All the "rioters" are rounded up and given the opportunity to repatriate themselves by pledging loyalty to the emperor as soldiers of the Japanese imperial army, sent to fight in the second Russian-Japanese war. The rioters are eventually assigned to a unit under the command of now Colonel Tatsuo Hasegawa.

During a battle against the Russians, they are captured by the Russian Red Army and sent to a POW camp deep inside the Soviet Union. Here is where fate intervenes: They are offered the chance to avoid a firing squad by "enlisting" in the Red Army to help defend Russia against the Nazi invaders during the battle of Stalingrad. There, the soldiers escape and begin a month-long trek over the mountains to arrive behind the German lines. Once again they are "inducted" into the army, ultimately ending up on the beaches of Normandy on June 6, 1944.

The action sequences are riveting and rival those of "Saving Private Ryan," the film to which all war movies will be compared. However, it is the relationship between these two men that makes "My Way" such a compelling story. The movie is now available on both DVD and Blu-ray and can be found at just about any Redbox video rental kiosk. I cannot recommend this movie highly enough. You will not be disappointed.
