SEATTLE'S MUSEUM OF FLIGHT



Seattle's Museum of Flight is located at Boeing Field--one of three airfields where Boeing tests its new aircraft.

One half of the museum is really the old working building in which the B-17 was designed and built. The other building is ultra modern and seemingly "German" in its sterile architecture.

The mostly glass main hall is naturally lit, with three levels of exhibits. There's a floor level for the many planes on display, and a second level for information displays with sections of planes and flight simulators. Finally, there is a massive third level with more hands-on displays. After an hour or so, you

come to the WWII section, which is on the other side of the building. This enclosed, darkened area feels like going back in time. It'll take you an hour or so to get through here if you read everything.

Let's not forget the outside of the building, which is surrounded by many aircraft from WWII through the Cold War. Across from the "red barn" you'll find the Concorde, Air Force One and the first Boeing 747, which is still flight worthy.





FOREIGN RELATIONS WITH OUR U.S. VETERANS OVERSEAS

Recently, the Butch O'Hare Chapter was contacted by the IPMS Eagle Squadron in Raleigh, N.C., and asked if we could help out with a donation. The Eagle Squadron is a special group within IPMS USA that through their Models for the Troops program - collects donated unbuilt model kits and distributes them to the five USO centers in North Carolina as well as the VA hospital in Durham. Any donated kit is given to either an active duty member of our military or a veteran who is undergoing treatment. And not only that, but kits are provided to their children so they can spend time with their dad or mom not only building a model but also a treasured memory. Think about the best times you've had in building a model. Were you all alone, or with a child helping him or her put all those crazy pieces together?

When I volunteered (or should I say Steve volunteered me), I had no idea what to expect. I contacted the donor in Hoffman Estates and set up a time for me to drive up and collect the donation. I was fully expecting to collect a few boxes of kits - maybe open with possible missing parts. But I was floored when she opened her garage. Her donation consisted of more than 500 (majority of them sealed) model kits from just about every model manufacturer known to man - Tamiya, Hasegawa, Revell, Monogram, Dragon, Italeri - you name it. It was also armor, cars, planes, jets, ships, helicopters and motorcycles. I made a total of four trips to her home to collect everything and now my garage is literally filled from floor to ceiling with models.

Part of the donation (143 kits in 12 boxes) was sent to the IPMS Wounded Warriors in San Antonio, Texas. Wounded Warriors is another special interest group within IPMS that assists our wounded veterans who are undergoing treatment at the Brook Army Medical Center at Fort Sam Houston. In addition, the group provides some assistance to their families as well. We all know that no member of our military ever serves alone. They each have loved ones who are "holding down the home front" while waiting for their return.

Another portion of the donation was sent out to the American Legion of Kansas to assist them with their upcoming slate of events, and locally to the Heart of a Marine Foundation, which will deliver the kits to service personnel undergoing treatment at the Chicago VA hospital. The Heart of a Marine Foundation was founded in memory of LCPL Phillip E. Frank USMC, who was killed in action April 8, 2004. The foundation provides comfort, support, financial assistance and additional resources to military personnel in all branches of the United States Armed Forces, including veterans and their families.





I have to tell you all that it has been an absolute pleasure and honor for me to work with these organizations. So on

behalf of the club, I would like to extend a most gracious and heartfelt thank you to the donors for their donations and to Jon Emery of IPMS Eagle Squadron, Dick Montgomery of IPMS Wounded Warriors, Don Harden of the American Legion of Kansas and Roy Frank of the Heart of a Marine Foundation for allowing us to assist them with these worthwhile programs. And I especially wanted to thank each and every member of the Butch O'Hare Chapter for agreeing

to accept and distribute this donation.

The How-To Hootch



The Art of Custom Decaling

Like Carl Said....

At our meeting where Carl Knable showed us how he measures equal points around a prop hub to make sure he gets his scratch built blades equidistant from each other, he used a simple piece of tape wrapped around the hub, then unwrapped and divided into equal distances, depending on the number of blades to be attached.

I used the same Carl Principle on my last Hobby Boss Sabre for the red triangular "tulip petals" around the drop tank noses. I first sprayed the noses of the tanks and a piece of decal paper with the same color red (photo 1). I used Testors Non-Buffing Metalizer to finish the tanks.

I wrapped a piece of tape around the Metalized drop tank at the line between the red and the silver, marking its beginning and the point where it overlapped. Then I removed the masking tape and divided it into four equal distances, since there were four "tulip petals" on each tank. I used that measurement to cut several triangles into the decal (photo 2).


Application of the decals was as simple as soaking the triangles off the sheet and applying them to the tanks every 90 degrees (photo 3). I apologize for the quality of this photo, but you get the idea. And did it work? No!

I was close, but I had neglected to take into account that the drop tank was a compound curve at its front end, unlike Carl's propeller hub, which was a constant diameter. That little bit of extra curve took up just enough of the decal and threw me off just enough so that each of the four petals was a tiny bit too small.

I had to mess around with them a bit and fudge here and there to get everything fitted and squared up. Caused me a little extra work and head-scratching, but it came out OK with the addition of markings from SuperScale decal sheet 72-289 (photo 4).

I was lucky I didn't have much time because of my new role as vote counter. I didn't have time to strike good deals, so the rent money was safe!

One of the reasons our show does so well and runs so smoothly is the fact that we have team members who volunteer to do the same jobs year after year and know exactly what to do. This is called "flow." I would like to thank all you guys for doing what you do. However, we had three positions open up this year that needed filling. I was able to fill two of them, but for the third, I had to do what us prezs do – I made me do it! But before we read about my heroic struggle, I would like to send out a big thanks and congrats to Rich Bingham for taking the role of Head Judge. He made it look so easy, and I must say how smoothly everything ran under his leadership. The second "newbie" was Hector Colon, who picked up the role as vendor table rep. Hector did an outstanding job in his new role as well.

But as for me, I had no idea how to pull off this awards thing, and after consulting with a couple of my software buds, I was really confused. We decided that it would be easier to just tabulate the awards data by hand, which is what I did. On Saturday, after the contest was under way and the intel started to filter back to my command center, I saw that my system was working, but I needed help.

And this is what my little story is really about. Two hours into my task, one of our new members, **Tim Jones**, came in to bring me some more index cards (that's what we used to write down info on the models). Tim saw the look on my face and asked if I needed any help. Before I started to cry, he sat down and started to help. About an hour after Tim started helping me, **Joe Mazzarella** (not a new member but can't make many meetings due to work) sat down and started helping out too. With the help of these two gentlemen, we finished tabulating the awards two hours early! We were able to start the awards ceremony on time, which is almost unheard of. Now that's what I'm talkin' about! A big **thank you** to Tim and Joe for stepping up and not even being asked.

Thank you to all my club brothers who makes this show happen every year. Thank you to Lake View Junior High School for letting us use your facilities again. Thank you to all the vendors that come to our show. Thanks to our brother clubs for bringing your outstanding models and displaying them on our club tables. And last, I would like to thank all the modelers and spectators who support our show year after year. Without you guys, this show wouldn't happen!

You guys are the best ever - see you next year!


