

It's much longer than it is wide because it houses the entire Saturn V rocket on it's side! Command and Lunar Modules are also present along with a dizzying array of NASA vehicles and equipment. Several tour packages are offered at various prices. The food is OK and even the kids exhibit is cool!

One tip is to buy your tickets online. The lines are pretty long and if there are language barriers, your wait could last 1 hour or more.

I can't wait to get back there again. The Space Shuttle Atlantis Plaza is now done! They were in the middle of construction when I was there.

We watched the online streaming video of the take-off from the Kennedy Space Center before we headed off to the museum, knowing it would be sometime before they arrived in DC airspace. For the first fly-over we stood near the entrance as seen in the photo attached. The STS Enterprise was still on display, but had the streamline tail cone attached in preparation for later ceremonies with the incoming and outgoing shuttles. My dad and I ventured up the observation deck which provided a view of where the mated pair had parked after landing with heavy lifting equipment ready to demate and mate.










Tax Police!


DANGER'S HOUR

All of us know of the Kamikaze during World War II. However, they have always been nameless, faceless individuals flying airplanes like missiles into American and Allied ships. <u>Danger's Hour</u> by Maxwell Taylor Kennedy (Robert Kennedy's son) changes that. The U.S.S. Bunker Hill was struck by two Kamikazes in rapid succession on May 11, 1945 and the explosions and resulting fire almost destroyed the aircraft carrier. Through the eyes of her sailors and pilots, we experience the horror and carnage that resulted from this attack.

The descriptions are fairly graphic, as are some of the pictures, and will leave you with a sense of the fear and bravery experienced by the men of the Bunker Hill. Although the ship was saved, she suffered heavy casualties, including most of VF-17, who died in their ready room. The strike did put the ship out of the rest of the war, and in that aspect, the attack was a complete success.

What follows, 60 years later is what makes this book so fascinating. Kennedy was able to piece together, using fragmentary evidence that would have fit into any CSI episode, the identity of the two pilots that hit the ship. This in itself is quite a feat, but hat is more interesting is the story of the second pilot, named Kiyoshi, who struck the ship and how he became a suicide pilot. This was no uneducated, desperate fanatic, but an educated young man who loved his country and had everything to live for, but still felt he had no choice but to volunteer to die for his country.



Kennedy was able to meet with several Kamikazes who were never ordered to fly and who still have reunions. These men knew Kiyoshi and were willing to share memories of him and their training. The way that they all were manipulated into volunteering and Kiyoshi's life story as reported in this book show much about the culture of Japan before and during World War II. The most frightening aspect of this whole story is how easy it was to manipulate these young men into becoming Kamikaze, and then how their honor kept them from backing out. Once they had made the commitment, they were going to die, and the only thing that could save them was the end of the war.

We meet the Kamikaze, and find out that he was as human as everyone else. This humanity changes how we view the men who flew these missions, and also how we must evaluate the choices made to end the war. In addition, it educates us about and changes the way we must think about the suicide bombers in the modern world, and how we should go about stopping them. While the book does not provide answers, it is thought provoking and will probably leave you disturbed.

I would encourage all to read this book. Enjoy, John

The How-To-Hootch



Easy Upgrades to Easy-Build Kits Part I

I admit to being semi-hooked on the Hobby Boss "Easy Build" kits, but in the vein of "you get what you pay for," some of the inexpensive-but-very-nice line can just a little bit of help in turning out the finished product.

The P-40B kit needs something done in its cockpit as molded, the entire forward part is a bathtub---just a big amphitheater. No instrument panel and no sidewall details are included, and the control stick is an oversized baseball bat (photo 1).

I snipped off the molded-in stick and made a new one from brass wire, then used the Trumpeter kit of the P-40B for some measurements to make a new instrument panel from sheet plastic (photo 2). I don't know for sure, but these kits look so close in appearance it almost seems the two Chinese companies shared some design work.

A couple of bits of plastic glued to the cockpit sidewalls were good representations of radio panels and so forth (photo 3). When painted up, they looked OK. You can see the hole I drilled in the cockpit floor for the new stick.

A couple other small details helped the build too....some masking-tape seat belts were added. The cowl gun fairings were drilled out to accept short bits of black-painted wire for the barrels. I punched out a circle of black decal to simulate the carburetor intake on the cowl, and added a ring sight in front of the windshield from a True Details brass set.

The canopy sills were pretty wide and flat, so I put a couple lengths of wire on them to simulate the rails which the canopy slides on. Other than those simple "improvements" and some stretched-sprue antennae, the kit is OOB including the decals (photo 4).
