














Club D.E.B.R.I.E.F. By Stan Kurcz





At our last meeting, we were treated to the art of resin mold casting taught to us by our very own Bill Soppet.


The seminar was very thorough and detailed. It always amazes me that what look like mere cooking utensils can crank out resin parts like nobody's business!




GHOST SOLDIERS

"Ghost Soldiers" by Hampton Sides is the story of some of the last survivors of the Bataan Death March left in the Philippines after the Allies landed and started taking back the island. It is also the story of the Rangers who were sent behind enemy lines to rescue the prisoners from the Japanese, who probably would have killed them all rather than let them be released to tell about the atrocities visited on them and their fellow prisoners. Hampton Sides' storytelling is vivid and engaging, weaving the two stories together in such a way that the storylines meet as the first bullets start flying in the raid.

The style of writing is quick, covering a lot of ground in less than 317 pages, especially considering that the Bataan Death March took place in April 1942 and the raid occurred in January 1945. That being said, the level of detail reveals the personalities of several of the prisoners, letting you know how they felt and how they survived. You meet members of the Philippine underground, who provided comfort and support to the prisoners.




Finally, you meet several of the Rangers as they take off on the type of mission they had envisioned but had never executed. The fact that they pulled off the raid as successfully as they did was a tribute to the capabilities of the Rangers and their quick but effective planning.

In fact, after three days hiking behind enemy lines, the Rangers had to rewrite their plan to take into account the newest intelligence. However, in defiance of Murphy's Law, the raid went off pretty much as planned. Then the Rangers had to get hundreds of weakened and sick prisoners 30 miles back across Allied lines before the prisoners could be free.

The fact that every prisoner was rescued is a miracle. The fact that the Rangers did it with almost no casualties is even more amazing. An interesting note: "Ghost Soldiers" was one of the sources for a movie called "The Great Raid," but the book is so much better than the movie. I recommend this book to anyone who has an interest in the time period or who likes to read an engaging adventure. Enjoy!

The How-To Hootch



Painting Multicolored Patterns and Schemes



Another Hobby Boss Sabre with what at first appears to be a dazzling and hard-to-do paint job? Well, it really isn't all that difficult to do--it just takes a little patience. I wanted to do a 390th FBS F-86 with its blue-and-white barberpole paint job, so the first step was to give the model an overall coat of Gunze Sangyo gloss white acrylic to serve as the base. When that dried, I masked off the little stripes on the tail and nose "picket fence" style. By that, I mean the method Grandpa used when he built a picket fence without using any fancy tape measures. He nailed the first board up, then placed the second and third boards in line snug up to it. He nailed the third board in place and then removed the second (middle) one-voila! A perfect opening between boards one and three that was exactly one picket wide.

I did the same kind of thing except that I used masking tape instead of boards and the stickum on the tape instead of nails. I laid down strips of tape on the model and then removed every other one. When done, I sprayed the blue on the model and removed the tape to reveal nice, even stripes (**Photo 1**).

As mentioned in my previous article, I spray Testors Non-Buffing Metalizer over my base acrylics, and that involved a little more masking so as not to get the silver on the blue-and-white areas. You can see in the photo that in front of the fin and on the very front of the nose, the stripes overlap in an X--that's OK because those will be sprayed over when the Metalizer's put on the







model. The blue fuselage sash was masked and sprayed at the same time as the stripes so that I wouldn't need to handle the model any more than I had to. That's important with acrylics, I've found.

To do the scallops on the drop tanks, I took the easy way out. When I sprayed the blue on the model, I also shot a piece of decal trim film with the same paint. When that dried, I used an ellipse template to cut some ovals in it, nestled up against each other (**Photo 2**).



When I dipped the decal in water, I discarded the ellipses and saved the little scallops that were between each one (**Photo 3**). Then I applied those to the sides of the drop tanks. They matched up with the blue-painted nose of the tanks just fine, and it was lots easier than trying to mask and paint those fine pointed ends (**Photo 4**).

The paint job just took some time masking, and there was a little bit of touch-up to do here and there, particularly in the small-radius corners like the base of the fin, which I did with a brush. The whole thing wasn't difficult--it just took time to mask it all. Another "complicated build" that really wasn't.

Ideas

Sprue and Chisel

Filing off Sprue Stubs Tip 13-1

When removing the "stub" that remains after cutting off a part from a kit sprue or tree, if you use a small, square file, it's possible to position your index or middle finger to help keep the file centered on the sprue stub, at least for one side of the stub. It will be decades, even centuries, before the file would reach the main body, so don't worry about it.

Some plastics that are used in manufacturer's kits, such as Academy, bend over when you're filing on the stub edge that's away from the edge of the part, like a fuselage part. Then they become difficult to remove by regular filing. See tip #13-2 for how to deal with this problem. Happy modeling!

A Hard Chisel from Rollin Four Tip 13-2

Once while I was filing with a small, four-sided file, it got away from me and fell on the floor. When I picked it up, I noticed that the tip had broken off. After the requisite swear words, I continued what I was doing. Some days later, I was removing the fuselage halves from an Academy Wildcat kit and filing off the stubs from the sprue, when I noticed that the inner edge of the stub--toward the body of the part--was folding over and wasn't being removed.

I was trying to think of what kind of tool would work like a chisel, and then I looked at the end of the file in my hand that had broken off (the file, not my hand!) and thought that the jagged edge looked a little bit like a chisel. So I tried it, and it worked! Maybe dropping it on the floor wasn't so bad after all. Happy modeling!



Seam-Line Problems Part III


Uneven Sanding

Too much sanding pressure outside of ridge produces a "dip."




Flat Sanding

Filling Large Holes or Gaps


