

Ad Venture Hobbies Closes Shop

Owner George Gaynor seemed to have developed a winning formula for maintaining his Wheeling hobby shop. "In the summertime, the R/C (radio controlled) section would support 60 percent of the business, with plastics bringing in the other 40 percent," he recalls. This business model would shift in the wintertime, with plastics supplying the 60 percent and R/C chipping in with 40 percent.

But no one could have foreseen the perfect storm of a deep recession, a breakdown of landlord relations and international trade practices bearing down on the thriving hobby shop.

George had been Ad Venture's owner for less than four years and was extremely hopeful that this shop was a sure thing. Formerly VENTURE HOBBIES under the previous owner, Don Phillips, the store had been in business nearly 30 years. When Don retired and sold the business to a new owner around 2006, sales took a tumble before the store finally landed in George's capable hands in 2009. Venture had had the reputation of being the No. 1 hobby shop in the Midwest, so we hobbyists thought that everything looked rosy once again.

Then the deepening effects of the recession took hold along with a generational shift in R/C customers. In addition, the unlicensed Chinese market started churning out cheap copies of popular R/C products, and George's younger R/C customers began buying their merchandise online from China to save money. "A \$300 foam airplane here costs roughly \$60 from China," explains George. And the quality of the Chinese products didn't seem to matter. "You break it, buy another one," he says. Soon even George's distributors were losing money.

When George would try to persuade his tech-savvy customers that buying in his store has real advantages, few listened. Customers would tell him, "I don't want to carry the box" or "The box won't fit in my car."

Many customers even came into the store, had the box opened so they could learn just enough about the product, and then bought the product from someone else online or by phone, right there in front of George!

His attempts to downsize and renegotiate the current lease failed when the landlord wanted to charge \$25,000 for a partition wall that realistically would cost only to \$2,400 to build, he says.

George says he hopes he can re-establish Ad Venture's presence in another location, if not in Cook County or Illinois. "Taxes are extremely high in Illinois...I'm looking into other locations as well," he says. Taking Ad Venture online is another option George is looking into.

"The plastic side of the store was doing well--we just couldn't compete with China," he says.

VENTURE is gone--but it won't be forgotten.









This Month in Military History


SHIP OF GHOSTS

"Ship of Ghosts" by James Hornfischer is the story of the survivors of the U.S.S. Houston CA-30, which was sunk off the Java coast early in 1942. While not as compelling and engaging as his previous book, "The Last Stand of the Tin Can Sailors," it is still an emotional and interesting piece of history.

The U.S.S. Houston was famous before World War II as President Roosevelt's yacht, which he took on several cruises. At the beginning of the war, she was caught in the Java sea area and was sunk in action against a Japanese battle fleet that was not where it was supposed to be. Many of her crew were captured by the Japanese, and this is where the story becomes more interesting. The Japanese treated prisoners much differently than any of the Allied powers or the Germans. This led to the families of the sailors not knowing for years after the sinking if their loved ones had survived.



The prisoners were used as slave labor, some in Japan proper, working in shipyards and the like. Many were sent to Thailand to help build the railroad immortalized in the movie "The Bridge on the River Kwai." But the conditions in Thailand were nothing like those depicted in the movie. The Japanese simply did not care if their workers lived or died--only whether the railroad was completed on time. The working and living conditions were primitive at best, and the jungle was as much of an enemy as the Japanese. Basic sanitation could mean the difference between life and death.

Unfortunately, the workers' plight was not discovered until the war was almost over, and then the real story was lost in the general excitement of the war's end. This book is definitely worth a read because it tells a tale that has been lost in the passage of time. These men deserve to be remembered and honored for their courage under the most extreme conditions possible. Hornfischer does a good job of correcting history's oversight. Enjoy.



The How-To Hootch



Mixing Paints By Walt Fink

No, not mixing in the sense of "shaken, not stirred"--to quote that 007 guy--but using more than one paint type on a model, in this case acrylic, enamel and lacquer (Photo 1).

This sorta crossed the line to my previous write-ups on doing complicated paint jobs, but there's really nothing complicated about the scheme I did. Despite warnings not to mix my paint types, I've tried it and it all seems to work with the sequence of things I use. So for what it's worth, here's how I proceeded on the Airfix Gnat kit.




I didn't mask anything off, as you can see from the photo, which made painting this color pretty easy. You can tell that I mount my models on a "handle" of sorts if I can, so I can paint them without touching them any more than I have to. I cut the enamel with Testors Airbrush Thinner--enamel doesn't react with acrylic, so I was safe there. Plus, the Airbrush Thinner is apparently "hot" enough that it sticks to the acrylic base. Note, though, that when this paint is sprayed, it comes out dead flat--there's more gloss on a rug than this stuff.

I let the enamel gas out for a few days, and when I



The aircraft's color scheme of Day-Glo and natural metal just needs a little planning. First thing to note is that all Day-Glo colors are semi-transparent and need to be sprayed over a white base. Otherwise, the finish color will be dull. After wiping down the model with rubbing alcohol to remove finger oils and other goop, I started the Gnat's scheme by spraying the entire aircraft with a base coat of Tamiya X-2 gloss white acrylic.

After that had dried a day or two, I went back with Testors #1173 Neon Orange enamel and sprayed the Day-Glo areas (Photo 2).





couldn't smell it any more, I went back and over-sprayed the entire model with Tamiya X-22 clear gloss acrylic. That restored the model's surface to "shiny status" and again, since acrylic doesn't react with enamel, I was safe using it.

Once the clear coat had dried, I masked off the Day-Glo areas and sprayed the NMF areas with Testors Non-Buffing Aluminum Metalizer (Photo 3). This is lacquer-based and might react with the enamel if not for the acrylic barrier. A caveat here: Lacquer WILL react with acrylic--it'll melt it. So the secret is to spray on some very light "attack" coats

first, and since Metalizer is almost dry when it hits the surface, it won't ruin things.

My theory--for what it's worth--is that the Metalizer particles hit the acrylic surface and the little bit of lacquer vehicle on them sticks them down before thy dry. Pretty instantaneously. Once the attack coat has dried, a heavier coat of Metalizer to cover is OK.

When the Aluminum Metalizer had dried, I went back with some low-tack (drafting) tape, masked off a few panels, and sprayed a darker accent color of Metalizer--in my case, just a bottle of Aluminum into which I'd put a few drops of gloss black acrylic (Photo 4).

When I first tried this method of mixing paint types, I had visions of the model's melting down into a pile of goo after several months. But so far,




the oldest model painted this way looks pretty much as good as it did in 2005 when it came out of my paint works (Photo 5). Oh, and by the way, I don't shake my paints. I DO stir 'em--with my super-high-tech stirrer, a tenpenny nail.


