They call it the "BoBo," and it's Trenitalia's E-464 present-day workhorse. In service since 1996 with 688 locomotives made, this train was designed to move the maximum amount of people as cheaply as possible. You have to understand that trains are a BIG thing in Italy, especially electric ones. They're efficient, reliable and mostly on time.

Although the E-464 is a modern design, the body style looks as if it were made in 1954. Square and boxy, it appears out of place against Trenitalia's high-speed rail trains. But it's comfortable, clean and reaches top speed at 99 mph. You will hardly ever go that fast, but it proves that

this is a serious commuter train. And because it's electric, the ride is smooth and quiet.

The windows are large and can be opened all the way so you can stick your whole head out if you wanted to (which I did). On trains where the air-conditioning was not working, this feature was a godsend.

These trains have a unique smell to them that's a mix of oil, a burning transformer and stale bread. Not exactly the clean and antiseptic smell of their highspeed cousins!

Train hobbyists will love that the BoBo's exist in many gauges and scales.


Norman Bates Would Be Proud

This kit review is on the Polar Lights' kit "The Psycho Mansion." About six months ago, one of my clients hired me to build The Psycho Mansion for his model railroad. He wanted the mansion to look all rundown, and you gotta give your customer what he wants, which means I gotta learn some new techniques!

The kit is molded in a light cream color plastic and has about 60 pieces. The window detail is printed on cardstock, and you get a big sheet of clear plastic for the window glass. The kit went together fairly easy despite the confusing instructions. I started by constructing the front porch and foundation of the house. Next, I assembled the walls of the house and last, the roof sections.



At this point, I started the painting process. I primed all the walls, inside and out, and the roof sections with light




Next, I painted the sections of the roof boxcar red. The trim was done in steel and the top of the roof done in flat black. After these parts had dried, I made a wash of 70 percent alcohol and dark rust brown pigment. I applied a good coat of wash to all the roof sections and let them dry. I go heavy on this wash because when you spray the dull coat clear to seal the wash and other weathering techniques, they almost disappear.

On to the house itself. After the gray primer dried, I took blue painters masking tape, cut it into a small section and applied it to one of the walls. I took my fingernail and burnished the tape into the side board detail. I then took a new #11 blade and cut the tape along the side boards (these cuts are going horizontal). Once I had the whole wall masked, I made vertical cuts in the masking tape at different spots on the side boards to create an uneven mask that simulates paint wear on the old house's walls.

I then peeled off the unwanted masking tape, leaving an "Aztec Pattern." (If you don't know what an Aztec Pattern is, you need to start building star ships.)







At this point, I reloaded my Iwata airbrush (shameless advertisement) with a flat white and sprayed the house. After the paint dried, it was time to remove the masking tape. I now had a house that was two-tone with sharp lines between the light gray and white paints. I needed to soften the transaction lines, so I wet sanded lines with 1000 grit sandpaper.

On to the porch. All of the porch railing and trim were painted with the light gray primer, and then sprayed with the flat white. After a couple of days of drying time, I used a microsaw blade from John Voteck's microsaw set to distress the rails, following up with a #11 X-Acto blade to complete the process. The result is a very weather-beaten look for the porch railing.

The house was now ready for the final assembly. I attached the porch and foundation to the base. Next, I attached the house to the foundation, then the roof to the house. And finally, all the little fiddly bits. Then it was time for the final weathering. I airbrushed a couple dustcoats of Comart Smoke (a water-based weathering airbrush paint from Comart) to dull down the already dull finish of the house. Next, I used weathering pigments to weather right below each window fixture. I picked random spots to create weather streaks along the roof line onto the house's siding.

All of the roof's railing was painted a flat black and weathered with one shade of dark gray weathering pigment followed up with three different shades of rust. The flat surface of the roof was painted flat black and dry brushed with a medium flat gray to bring out the detail. The final step was to spray dullcoat over the entire house to seal in all of the weathering.

At this point, I started on the landscaping part of the project. I brushpainted parts of the base a light brown and the other parts sand. After the paint dried, I worked in small sections, wetting the surface of the base with a 50/50 mix of white glue and water with a drop of dishwashing soap (this breaks the surface tension and allows the glue to flow better). While the section I was working with was wet, I sprinkled on static grass, using different colors to add depth. I hit some spots with very light colored grass to represent dead patches of grass.



I added various types of ground cover and different sizes of talus (very small rocks) used in model railroading to add life (or dead stuff, in this case) to the base. The last thing I did was to drill a small hole in the base to plaint my tree, and I'm done!

I really enjoyed building this kit and learning a few new techniques to pull off this build. My favorite part was the landscaping. It's sooo easy, and it's really hard to mess up. Now for the hard part—turning over my little model to its new owner.

Got more stuff on the bench to finish and review. See you then.

The How-To Hootch



Gloss Work...The Old-Fashioned Way

Opening the box, you'll see that Trumpeter's F9F-2P Panther is of quality construction: very fine recessed panel lines, separately wrapped canopy and windscreen plus an easy-to-read instruction manual. The build is relatively simple and straightforward, with cockpit construction first, wings and fuselage next. However, the fuselage comes in four pieces--a two-part main body and the two-part nose cone.

After much trial and error, I found that the two-piece nose cone should be attached one piece at a time to the completed body. This ensures that the nose pieces line up with the rivets and seam lines of the main body, and saves a lot of needless sanding and re-scribing. Then, the center seam is all that needs to be taken care of.

The intakes are a bit tricky, but should be carefully lined up with the intake opening so little sanding is done here as well. You will still have to fill a seam here, but it's much easier

when both edges are level.



The simple one-piece tailpipe is surprisingly hard to seat. There are no solid stops for lineup--just two small pins that don't locate well at all. Once you get one pin in place, glue it with slow curing liquid cement (Testors) and dry fit the other half of the fuselage. Before the glue sets you can wiggle the tailpipe around until it's square. Tape the fuselage together until the pipe is dry. For extra strength, superglue that tailpipe in place after the cement has dried. (If it comes loose after you've glued the fuselage together, you're in a lot of trouble.) Put the horizontal stabilizers on next.

Now that the body is together and all of the seams have been taken care of, it's time to paint! I use Tamiya Acrylics, so light gray is my primer.

I dust on four to five thin coats of primer. Afterwards, I sand with 3200 sandpaper. Remember to sand with only the weight of your fingers...you're not sanding hardwood! Once smooth, it's time to lay the color coats. Royal

blue is closest to 1950s navy blue, so off we go. I dust on several layers of blue. Each layer is four to five dust coats. Sand with 3200 wet/dry sandpaper in between layers.

Use an old toothbrush and a lot of water to get the sanding residue out of the panel lines. Add another layer, wash, and repeat. Three to four layers should be good enough. Finish your last layer with 3M's Finesse-it II polishing compound. You will have a mirror finish by this time.

Once the model is painted and polished, handle it only with gloved hands. If you don't, you'll leave indelible fingerprints on the model that can't be polished out. Then it's sand and re-polish.

Without clear coat, this method will take about seven days to paint this 1/48 kit. All together you'll be applying roughly five dusted coats of primer, 15 dust coats of paint, and about five coats of clear

once the decals are on. Sand, clean and polish the clear coat as well if you choose to do so.

Hooked On Hobby Boss

Another complicated paint job that isn't....much, anyhow.

I tried yet another Hobby Boss Easy-Build F-86 kit, but this one caused me some tedium of masking and painting.

First step: I sprayed the aircraft overall gloss white acrylic, then shot the nose black and the wings and tail red for the arctic markings (Photo 1).

Once I had the red and black areas masked off, I sprayed the whole model with Testors non-buffing Aluminum Metalizer. When it was dry, I used low-tack drafting tape to mask off a few panels and spray some darker Metalizer there for some tonal difference. I misted thinned light gray on the center section of the wing to represent the structural core. (Photo 2).

I ran the kit decal sheet through my copier to make some masking guides. I wouldn't be using the kit decals, but I needed to know how big to make the natural metal areas where I'd be applying the Alaska Air Guard lettering. I started applying the lettering from aftermarket sheets (Photo 3).

To do the national insignia's thin natural metal surround, I cut circles from a silver trim film sheet and some rectangles for the bars, and applied them to the wing (Photo 4). Applying the insignia over them gave me the little silver outline I wanted.

The black nose on this aircraft had scalloped "swooshes" on each side. Rather than try to mask and paint them, I painted the nose black as described above, cut ellipses into black decal trim film, then discarded the ellipses and used the area between them (Photo 5).

The black lines on the fuselage forward of the fin are decal strip, and the lettering on the wing is a custom








decal.

The finished model came out OK (Photo 10)--it just took some time.

The drop tanks were black with offset scalloped trim extending from the nose toward the tail. I again used trim film--white this time--to accomplish the job. First step was to paint the nose of the tank white (Photo 6), apply a spear of white decal film (Photo 7), then cut those adjacent ellipses again like I did for the nose flash (Photo 8) and use the area between them to make the 'Fillets' for the spear (Photo 9).

This event is open to ALL MODELERS WHO ARE WELCOME to compete in the contest subject to the following:

- All exhibits must be the sole work of the individual whose name is on the Entry Form.
- IPMS Regional/National and previous O'Hare Contest-Winning Models are ineligible for competition. The O'Hare Chapter invites <u>exhibition</u> of these Award Winners for display in an Exhibition-Only Area. No contest-entry fee applies to Exhibition-Only. However display is subject to space availability.
- The Registrar shall help contestants determine the classification of each entry. In the event of controversies the Contest-Head Judge will render a final decision.
- Exhibits are not to be handled or touched by anyone other than the owner-contestant. For space or viewing considerations a Contest Official or Contest Judge may carefully re-adjust placement of an exhibit on a display table.
- The O'Hare Chapter maintains Family Oriented Values. Visually suggestive exhibits will be segregated from direct public display at the discretion of Contest Officials.
- Diorama Category exhibits will be judged in its entirety. Story, presentation, detail, groundwork, special effects, figures and accessories will all be considered in judging these exhibits.
- A base is recommended for all exhibits; however a base or other accessories will not be judged as part of a non-Diorama exhibit. The Judging Committee <u>highly</u> recommends the use of a base and that the exhibit be secured to the base as well.
- Dust Covers are allowed; however Dust Covers may impair the Judging team's ability to see all the work.
- "Chicago Rules" are used to judge exhibits. A copy of the criteria is available at the Registration Table on the day of
 the event or by request. All entries will be judged on the skill of construction, accuracy and detail, degree of difficulty,
 overall finish and presentation. A great amount of added detail will not make up for a poorly constructed model.
- Contest Judges are primarily members of the O'Hare Chapter and work in teams of three with one judge designated as Team Leader to assure the integrity of the decision.
- Interference with the judging of an exhibit by a contestant will result in immediate disqualification of the contestant's exhibit.
- The Judges decisions will be final. In order to prevent misunderstanding Representative Judges will be available immediately after the awards presentation to answer questions.
- Photography by spectators for their own use is welcome. It is the obligation of the photographer to prevent interference with other event participants. Photography of an exhibit for commercial purposes is not allowed without the express permission of the exhibitor. The photographer is responsible to the exhibitor for any damages resulting from their activities.
- There is No Smoking allowed within the School or Exhibition/Vendor-Trader areas. School District 66 has designated the parking lot behind the Gymnasium as the approved smoking area. Please help keep the property clean.


