D-Day is usually remembered for the thousands of men, tanks and planes storming the beaches of Normandy, France on June 6, 1944. We've all seen the film files and photos and certainly the quintessential motion picture on the subject, "Saving Private Ryan."

What we tend to forget--although not intentionally--is that without the Liberty ships, D-Day would never have happened.

From 1941 to 1943, 2,710 identically armed merchant ships carried "beans and bullets" to our fighting forces around the world. They were mostly known for crossing the treacherous North Atlantic into the waiting teeth of German U-boats.

Originally designed by the British, the ships used identical parts that could be stamped out or forged quickly. American mass production assured that these ships could go from keel laying to launch in 60 days!

You can still see the last remaining Liberty ship in San Francisco: the Jeremiah O'Brien.

Walking up to the dock, you clearly see that this ship is massive. You'll pay a very minimal fee for touring the whole ship, and then it's up the narrow gangplank to the top deck. From the starboard quarter bow, you can see the whole city of San Francisco.

Everything is as it was in 1944. The gun emplacements, bridge reinforcement and shielding, hatches and covers. The only modern items to note were the electronic touchpads explaining what this or that part of the ship was.

Your tour then takes you below decks to all of the cabins, including the mess, bridge, and engine room. What's pretty clear immediately is that this is not a U.S. Navy ship. The staterooms are big and spacious and every room has a head (toilet). The Merchant Marines were a fighting force but still civilian in nature.

Three people permanently live on the ship to maintain it, and she's taken out for cruises a couple of times a month.

The Jeremiah O'Brien participated in the 50th anniversary of D-Day and looks to go to the 75th! After the ship sailed the exact route to England used during the war, the British government was so happy to see it that they paid its expenses while in port. They even sent the British fleet to greet the Jeremiah O'Brien when it sailed in.



# WARTHOG

#### FLYING THE A-10 IN THE GULF WAR



The Gulf War in 1991, or Operation Desert Storm was unique in many ways. One of those was the full-scale combat debut of the A-10 Warthog, an aircraft that was due to be retired at the time but is still in the inventory almost 25 years later. "Warthog" by William Smallwood tells the story of the A-10 in the

Persian Gulf and of the men who flew the plane on more different missions than the designers at Republic ever dreamed.

Smallwood researched the book right after the pilots returned from the Persian Gulf, so the stories were fresh and vivid in their minds, and he translates those images to the written page well: from the issues with the initial deployment of the Warthog, flying without an autopilot from the United States to Saudi Arabia and refueling several times during the flight, to how it felt to fly over the Iraqi border and rain destruction down on the enemy.

Smallwood also describes the missions developed as the plane and pilots proved themselves in combat, covering reconnaissance, air-to-air combat, forward air control and even some Wild Weasel work destroying anti-aircraft sites. All of this in an aircraft designed for blasting Soviet tanks into scrap metal--which, by the way, happened quite a bit over Iraq as well. Another mission at which the A-10 excelled was operating at night, even though the plane was not equipped at the time with any sort of night vision system or sensors. They even took to using the television on the Maverick missiles they carried to help them find targets.



The A-10 squadrons lost six aircraft during the war--four shot down and two crashes after battle damage. Two pilots were killed, and three served time as POWs. An additional four aircraft were seriously damaged, but all were flown home, although two were retired after a more detailed inspection. The A-10 acquitted itself well during the war, a tribute to its design, the pilots who flew it and the crews who maintained the Warthogs on the ground. Warthog is a fitting tribute to these men. Enjoy!
