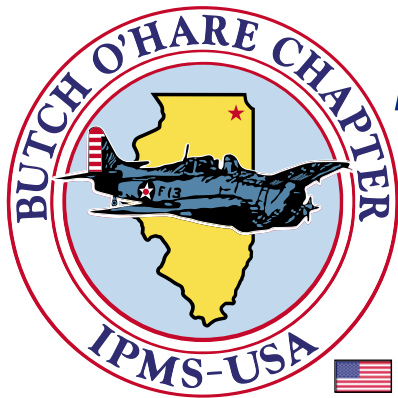

New York's 9/11 Museum...Wow!

At first glance, the National September 11 Memorial & Museum in New York City may not have much in common with scale modeling. But I think this is a subject EVERY modeler is interested in, especially since we are meeting on the anniversary of that horrific event.

What happened on Sept. 11, 2001, is now history. As modelers, our stock in trade is mining history to make it come to life. As ex-military, ex-police or ex-firemen, many of us modelers understand the unique challenges that led to the deaths of so many on that day.

This museum is dedicated to those who gave their lives.

Built on the twin towers site, the museum is like a phoenix rising from its ashes. By this printing, all of the World Trade Center buildings will have been completed.

Most of the museum is underground beneath the memorial pools placed in the exact footings of the twin towers. In it you'll find an enormous array of the remains of the original buildings as well as damaged fire and police apparatus. These building footings lead to an enormous hall where

you can still walk around the completed towers.

A timeline of how the whole event unfolded is stunning, leaving you with the exact same feeling you had that day when the towers fell. That section alone will take 50 minutes to get through. The personal memorials are extremely touching--items of clothing, parts of office equipment and pieces of paperwork that carpeted the streets that day.

The whole visit will take about 2.5 hours. The time will quickly pass. We all should see this place.

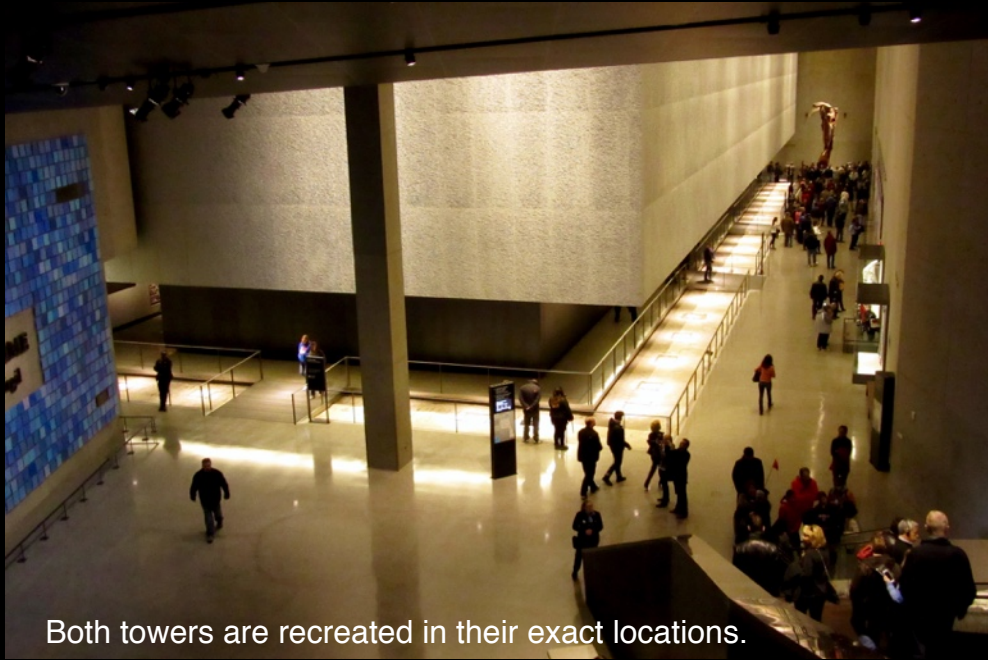

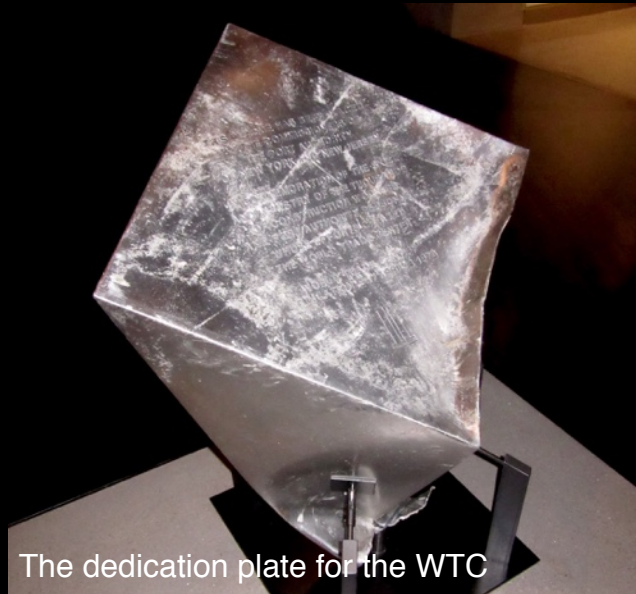

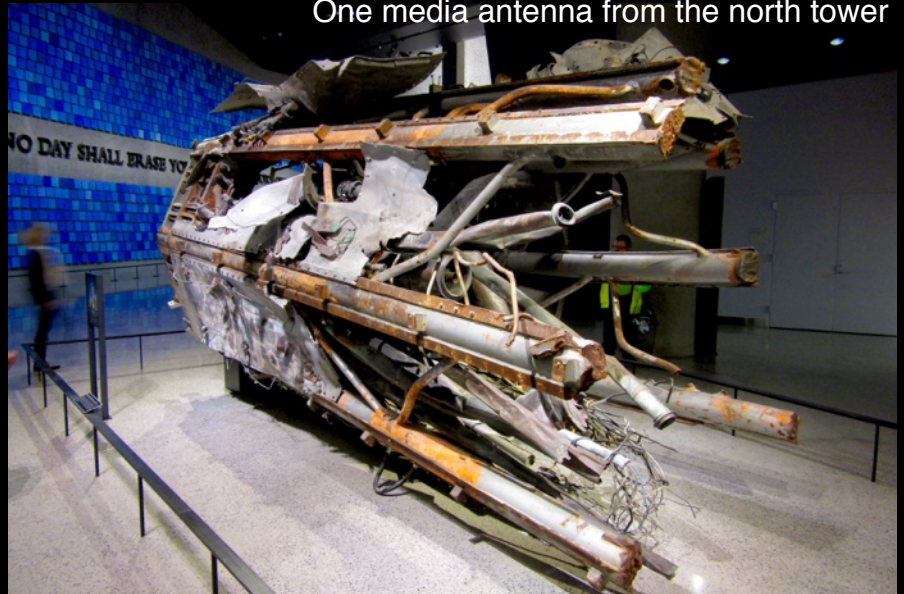

We had a good turnout at our August meeting, with 30 members attending and 16 (more than half!) participating in show-and-tell. Following an update on our budget and planning for our November show, Stan gave a nice talk about Shep Paine, who passed away Aug. 1, sadly. He also showed a very nice video montage of Shep and some of his works. A number of club members reminisced on the influence Shep and his work had on their modeling.

The club unanimously voted to have a Shep Paine Diorama Award for the November contest. Stan also told us about the World Model Expo, which focuses on military miniatures, coming to Chicago in July 2017, the first time the expo has been in the United States since 2005. We (the club) may see about supporting/participating in this world modeling event.

We had quite a turnout for show-and-tell, with everything from a scratch-built stand for a yawl to a variety of aircraft, armor, trucks, tractors and cars, some sci-fi, books, and a paper model of a castle! We also were treated to a "large" WW II German locomotive service diorama by Frank. We finished up the evening with a dry brushing demo by Steve Day.

Next month is our second Build It night of the year, and our show-and-tell theme will be "Display Teams." See you on Sept. 11.

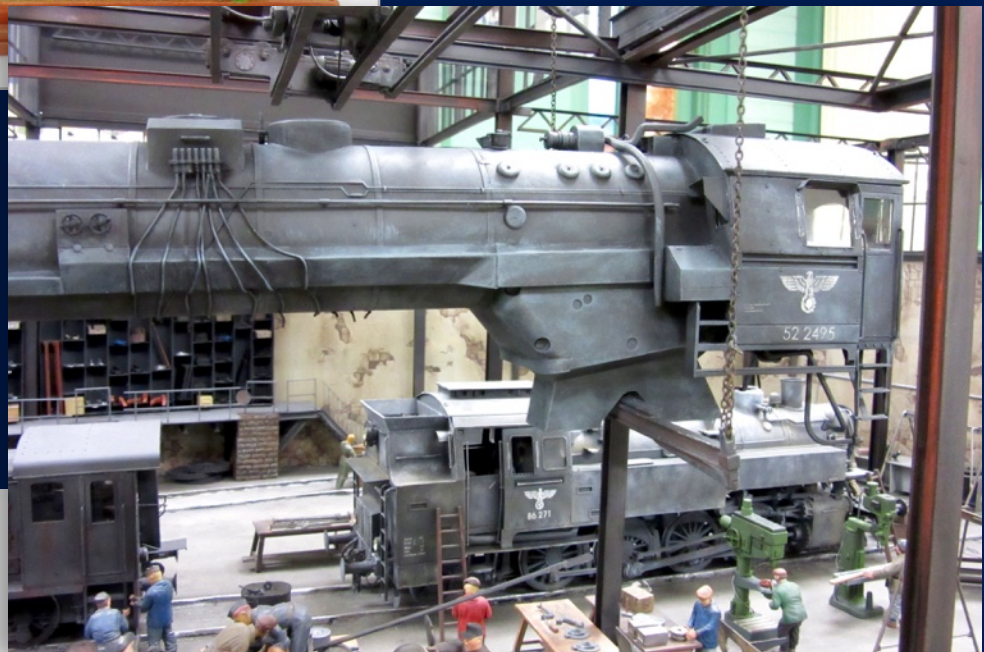

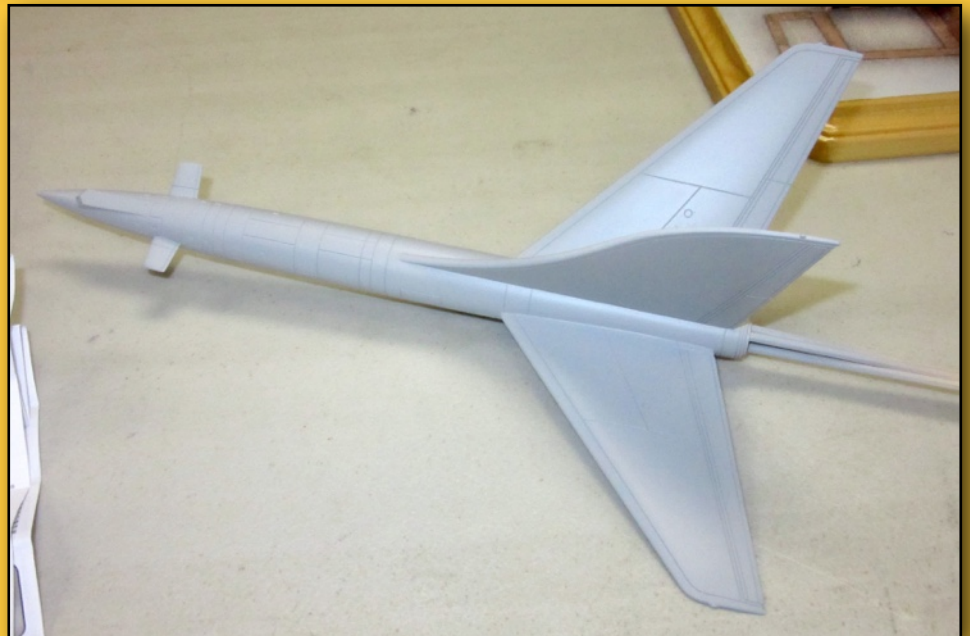

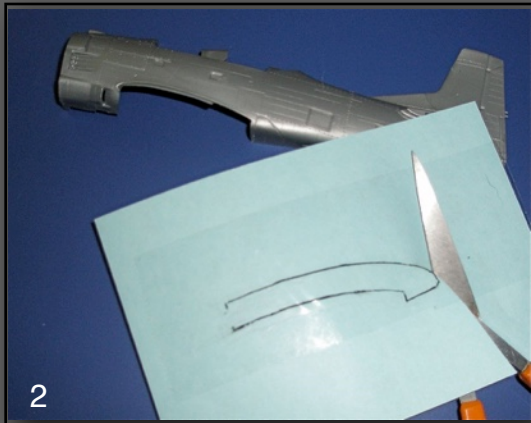
Tales of the Tape: “I’m exhausted....”

When I built the model of the T-28C, which I carrier-qualified in back in 1962, I used the tape trick for making a decal for the black painted exhaust trail “panels” on the



fuselage. My first step was placing a piece of clear packing tape on a “raw” fuselage half and using a French curve to draw the approximate curve of that panel directly on the tape (Photo 1).

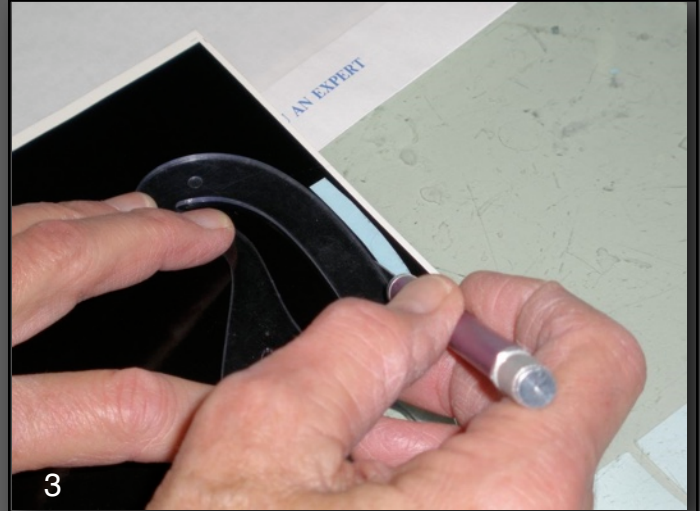


Once I had it the right size and shape, I peeled the tape off and applied it to a piece of cardstock, then used the French curve again to refine the shape (Photo 2). I cut out the cardstock and used that as a template to cut solid black trim film

to the right shape (Photo 3).

Reversing the template and repeating my cutting gave me a mirror-image but identical-sized panel for the other side of the model; I applied them just as I would’ve any other decal. (Photos 4 and 5).

Probably not the way the big decal makers do their stuff, but it worked OK for my purposes.

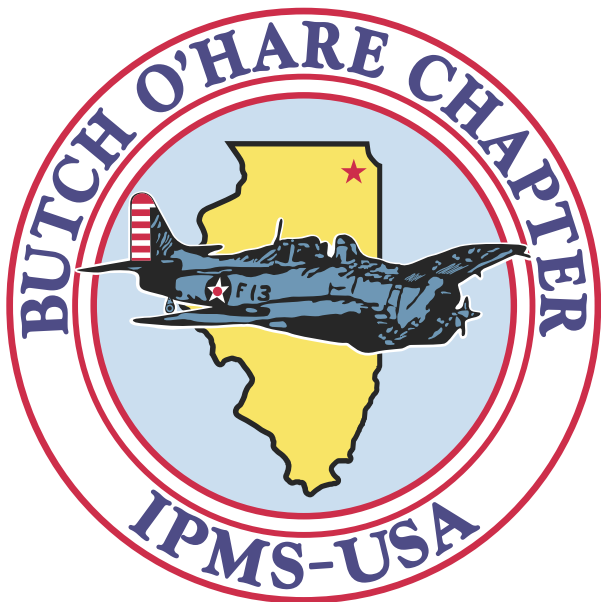

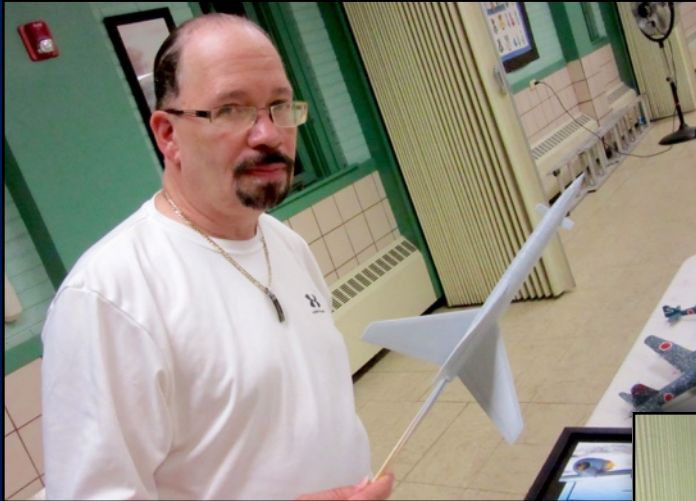

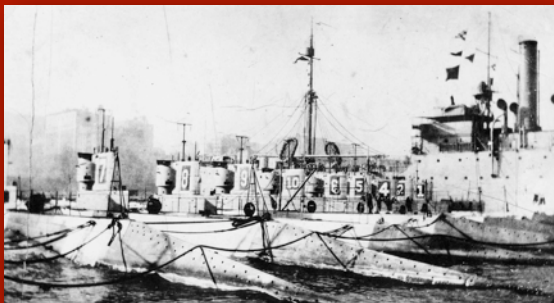

Dry Brushing the Easy Way

Hey, guys: Here are a few words to follow up on my Dry Brushing Demo from last month's meeting.

First, dry brushing is one of the easiest modeling techniques that renders outstanding results. Dry brushing is one of the most misunderstood and overdone modeling techniques as well.

What is dry brushing? Dry brushing is when you dip your paint brush in your paint and then run the paint brush across a paper towel, removing 80 to 90 percent of the paint. You then run your almost dry paint brush across the object you are dry brushing. Because the paint brush has very little paint on it, only very small amounts of paint will transfer from the paint brush to the high points on the model. We usually will use a lighter color to dry brush with, which will make your details on your model "pop"! The whole trick to dry brushing is to not have too much paint on your brush, and to not use a too heavy stroke with the paint brush.

I use all types of paint to dry brush--enamels, acrylics, oil base paint and even pastel powders. It all depends on what effect I'm trying to reproduce.

With very little practice, you can master dry brushing. It's so easy. Try it, get it, then sit back and marvel at this super-detailed model you have created!

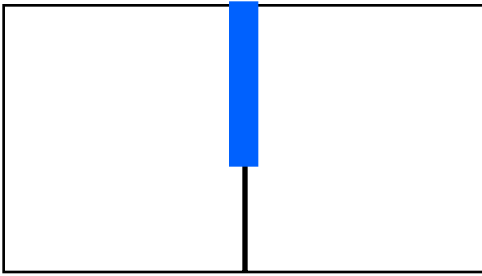

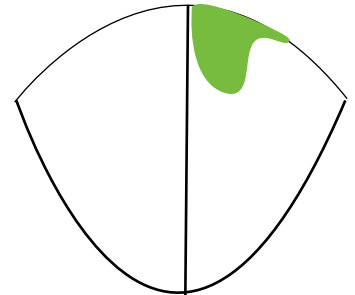
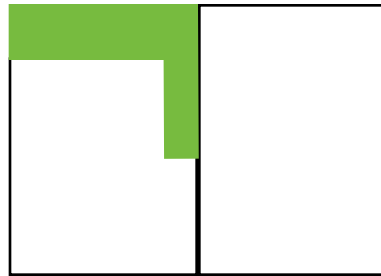
Even Seam

Uneven Seam

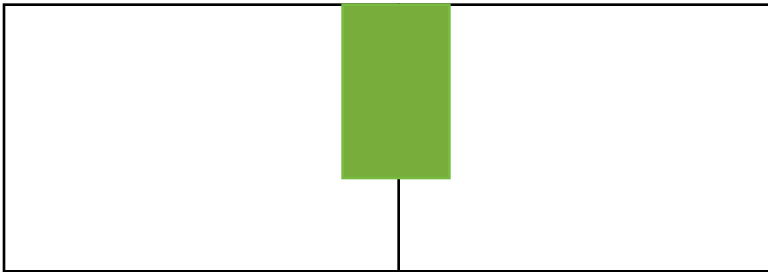
Fill seam and level the surface.



**If the higher side is relatively small, then sand level before filling.*

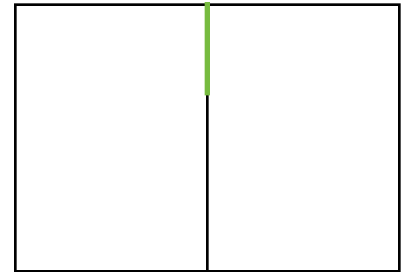
Large Gap

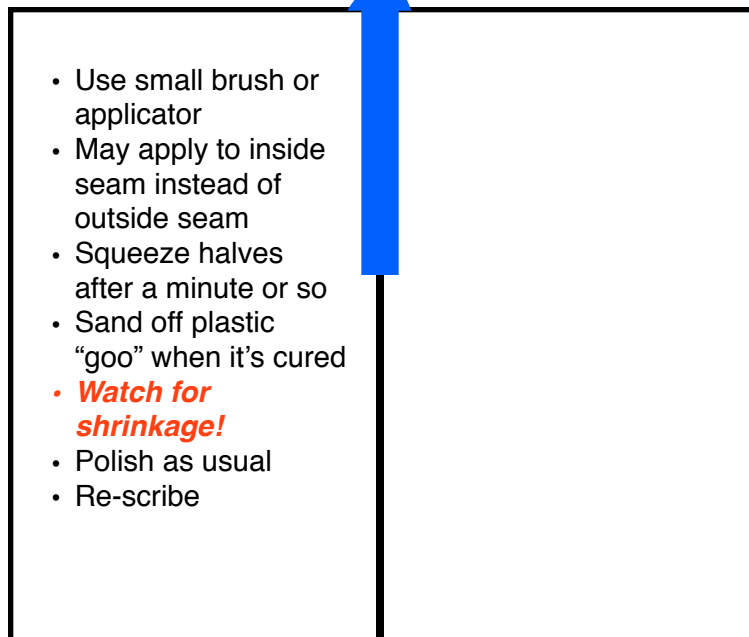

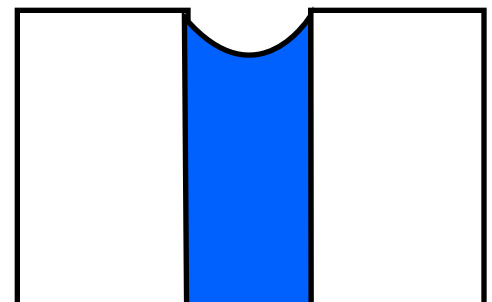

In Remembrance



Howard Sheperd Paine



Howard Sheperd Paine, who for six decades tirelessly worked to spread the popularity of art miniatures worldwide, died on Saturday, Aug. 1. An extraordinary artist, prolific author, widely respected military historian and renowned collector of military artifacts, he was 69 years old.

Universally known to his many friends simply as "Shep," the artist suffered a stroke at his home on Chicago's Northwest Side on July 27. Though he never regained consciousness, he spent his final days in the company of loved ones—a small group representing the countless others who came to consider him a friend and mentor through his four books for hobbyists, how-to tip sheets, classes and seminars, co-founding of the triennial World Model Expo, and championing of the Open System of Judging for his beloved Military Miniature Society of Illinois and other organizations devoted to the art of miniatures around the world.

In addition to the MMSI, Shep was a driving force in the Company of Military Historians and several Napoleonic historical organizations. He served as president of all of those groups at different times, and was a dedicated recruiter to their ranks.

Immediate services will be private, but the MMSI is planning a "Celebration of Shep Paine's Life" where all will be welcome following the group's annual Chicago show on Sunday, Oct. 25. Details will be announced soon.

The MMSI has established the Shep Paine Education Fund, which is accepting tax-deductible donations in his honor to continue his invaluable work as an educator and proselytizer for the art of miniatures via classes, seminars and other projects.
