WHAT'S NEW AT THE MARINE CORPS MUSEUM IN QUANTICO

The Sikorsky UH-34D (above) represents the standard taxi used by marines during the early 1960s to carry them into battle. This display is one of the newer additions to the National Museum of the Marine Corps in Quantico, Va.

Every mannequin displayed in the museum is of an actual marine, based on either the real-life model or a photograph in memoriam. Sgt. Jhon Espinal was kind enough to stand in front of his likeness. I can't exactly remember how many hours he stood, but it was a lot. Thanks, Jhon.

I also noticed more scale models added to various museum displays, mostly 1/72 scale. The Chosin Reservoir and Khe Sanh exhibits are excellent examples of fighting in extreme cold or extreme heat. You do feel the difference here.

Most exhibits haven't changed in the past few years, however, including the popular yellow footsteps in front of the marine bus that delivers new "boots." You can hear the yelling and screaming as if you were there starting Day 1 of training.

The Iraqi and Afghanistan theaters of operation are still underway, but for now there are plenty of real marines roaming around to help, the upstairs chow halls are great, and the gift shop is well worth visiting. I try to visit every three to four years to see what's new--it's one of the best museums anywhere for its size.



Stress Reliever:
Build
a "Funner" Project!



Are you getting stressed out by counting rivets, rescribing panel lines, color matching and masking that elusive, perfect, contest-winning paint job? Are you sweating a fast approaching contest deadline? Is the arch-villain Murphy and his law beginning to interfere with your newest masterpiece? Relax! Every model we make does <u>not</u> have to be a trophy winner.

As a matter of fact, building specifically to win a contest can be crushing to some if they do not win! I have actually seen a grown man cry because his model did not win at a major contest. This is a hobby--have some fun with it once in a while. I personally build for the enjoyment of the new challenge, working hard on commission builds, but I no longer build for contests (burned out?). That is why I hereby present my steampowered robot war-machine, OLIVER!

This was a fun build of a steam-powered 1890s (sort of) clumsy-looking fighting machine (steampunk?) using modified arms and legs from a Bandai 1/20 scale Scopedog kit I found on eBay for \$20 (free shipping).

The quality of this Bandai kit stunned me! Some .030 sheet styrene formed the main body (really just a box with a pyramid box as the front). Bits of plastic junk and sprues from my "kit remains" container formed most of the rest to make the model look "busy." A leftover steam engine cylinder, an aluminum

cigar tube for the boiler, and a brass tube with a ring around the muzzle pretty much finished the major build. Decorative costume jewelry items helped backdate the design somewhat. The lady customers in the costume jewelry aisle at Jo-Ann Fabrics were giving me some strange looks as I fumbled through the shiny bits and pieces. I just glared at them, and they hurried away.

The mace is a styrofoam ball with wooden spikes made from pencil-sized dowels tapered in my crank pencilsharpener. I couldn't resist the taxidermy eyes and flying tiger mouth to make OLIVER look scary (sort of). The 1/48 figures give scale to the piece and also help to backdate.

Give a fun project a try--use your imagination! Do not build it to enter a contest, but if it should turn out to be something you are proud of, then enter it or at least bring it in to a meeting and let us enjoy your work!

OK, so I decided to combine two trips into one: I went to see and board the Hawaii Mars during AirVenture 2016 in Oshkosh, Wis. They had a VIP tour available for \$125. Not that there was not enough to see on the grounds, but the seaplane base has always been a nice getaway.



After the tour, you received the book "The Mighty Martin Mars," written by Wayne Coulson and Steve Ginter. Wayne is the owner of the

last two remaining Martin Mars seaplane. I had chance to meet and talk to him for awhile. He and his group were overwhelmed by how many people wanted to tour the Super Scooping Air Tanker. But to the many aviation people who attend Oshkosh from all over the world, it was a chance to see a historic aircraft.





As an aviation and warbird geek, nerd, historian or whatever I am called, this had to be done. The tour lasted about 30 minutes, including the boat ride to this massive seaplane. Design work for the Martin Mars, later to be the JRM-3, began in 1935. It has the wingspan of a Boeing 747 and is powered by four Wright R-3350-24WA engines. Some 7,200 gallons of water can be picked up in 32 seconds and dropped at 2,600 gallons per second to cover 3.5 acres.
