The RAF Museum London Red Arrows Plane Story and Photos by Stan Kurcz

During a recent visit to England I explored the RAF Museum London, just a short tube ride from central London. It's located in Hendon on the edge of what was Hendon Aerodrome, the original flying training school founded in 1909. With nearly 100 aircraft from the most modern F-35 back to original World War I machines, it's an impressive museum.

My visit began in the Milestones of Flight gallery. On one wall there is a description of aviation events from the Wright Brothers through the turn of the century. In the hall and overhead is a selection of aircraft from the earliest planes through the British Harrier.

From there you walk to the Historic Hangers, created to house part of the museum's collection of fighter aircraft. This is dedicated to Sir Sidney Camm, the designer of the Hawker Typhoon that sits in pride of place. The Historic Hangars contain five separate exhibitions, each telling a different story about the RAF and its aviation history.

Next is the Bomber Hall exhibition, which follows the development of the bomber from its first appearance in World War I to the highly sophisticated machines of today. It tells of the achievements of RAF Bomber Command and the U.S. Army Air Forces in World War II. During the combined bombing offensive, 131,000 men died.

My favorite on display was the Vulcan bomber. It is hard to imagine how large this plane is, and standing next to and underneath it is indescribable. It's a shame that the last airworthy example is taking its last flight this summer.

Unfortunately the Battle of Britain hanger was closed, so I completed my tour in the Grahame-White Gallery, which houses a collection of World War I aircraft and artifacts. This is an astounding collection of World War I aircraft, several of which are originals. It is a tribute to the men who flew these "crates" with only rudimentary equipment and support.

I would say that this is a very impressive collection and as good as any in the world. If you are in London, you will not want to miss it.



And now for Show & Tell: *Hector* started out by mentioning the "Build something different" theme for the Christmas meeting and said that instead of a car, he was going to build an airplane. *Dick Beemer* brought in a Czech model of the Bell XP-77, which has a canopy that rolls back into the fuselage! *Stan Kurcz* displayed a combat tractor on Iwo Jima with mesh beach matting. *Carl Knable* announced "only four models this month!" with a new Minicraft B-52, a Special Hobby F-86, an Airfix FW-190-1and an Eduard FW-190-4. A lively discussion ensured of the rat/mouse symbol on Adolph Galland's ME-109. *Steve Day* brought Bandai's latest TIE striker and TIE fighter from Star Wars. *Ron Carlson Jr.* and his daughter, *Sophia*, had a 1/144 AT Walker, and *Don Grajek* had several Japanese/Italian aircraft, one of which was a special conversion from a Lockheed Hudson airplane, one of his proudest achievements. *Don Smith* offered some thoughts about airbrushes, using heat shrink for A-7 air intake, and a \$1 store closeout toy plane.

My First Model Contest



In 1953 I came across an ad for the Fisher Body Craftsman Guild contest. It was a nationwide auto design: Build a 1/12 scale model of your design, send it to the General Motors design studio, and win a prize (maybe)! First prize was a scholarship to the California Art Center, and there were cash prizes for the three best model cars in each state. Since I had a <u>very</u> difficult time in high school, I was hopefully in it for the money, not for more "bad days."

Fisher Body furnished a free 1/12 scale drawing of the interior space, driver seating, and wheelbase limits; everything else was up to the entrant's idea of a modern auto. Checking my small collection of hand tools and pile of balsa wood and thinking no normal young designer would ever consider making a future station wagon, I naturally took the less traveled route!



I looked over the 1953 lineup of GM cars--especially wagons--to get an idea of what was needed. Perhaps a wraparound windshield, swooped side trim, flying buttress side wings, and tag the entry as "Safari"? (The next year, a newly named Pontiac Safari wagon came out with a wraparound windshield and swooped chrome side trim, surely designed years before mine.) When you reached the point where your model was ready for wheels, you sent a picture to GM for a free set of wheels, along with details on where and how to ship your model to GM for judging.

Carving the balsa blocks was very basic, but finishing and painting wasn't! I don't recall paint spray cans being in stores then, and I had no spray gun. So I took a FLIT hand-pumped bug spray and replaced the tin siphon tube with a brass one. Then I sprayed all the primer and cream and turquoise lacquer, pumping like a madman to coat a rather large model. The end result in 1954 was a \$100 award for second place in Illinois and a surprise request from GM to purchase my station wagon for an additional \$300! (I accepted).

The three following years, my entries resulted in two second-place awards and one third place. The money was well-spent: \$75 for a rust-free '34 Ford five-window coupe, and \$100 for a banged-up '41 Ford sedan that I stripped for the engine, trans,



hydraulic brake system, disc wheels and a gas tank. In the September 1955 issue of *Rod & Custom*, my '34 coupe was a feature car!

I no longer have the '34 coupe, chopped top '34 Ford full fendered pickup, or my Model A Ford roadster on a '32 Ford frame, all of which were short-term projects for learning to build cars. Anyone interested in buying a FLIT sprayer?



FROM THE OVAL OFFICE



EVERY MAN A TIGER

The Gulf War Air Campaign

The late Tom Clancy is known for his in-depth and heavily researched books on the military, and this work is no exception. Though Clancy is the author, it's really Chuck Horner's story as told through his own writings and recollections.

Horner, an F-16 pilot, commanded the U.S. and allied air assets--the forces of a dozen nations--during Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm, and in this capacity he was responsible for the design and execution of one of the most devastating air campaigns in history.

As is typical of Clancy's books, "Every Man a Tiger" is full-sometimes to the point of being overstuffed--with the intricacies of the air force and other military branch command structures. When he gets deep into the inner workings and inner sanctums of various commands and organizations, a well-placed insert by Horner returns the reader to point-of-the-spear reality and keeps up the interest in the book.


I found a great number of Horner's stories of working with various other commands and commanders--including Norman Schwarzkopf himself--to ring lots of bells for me with

memories of my own time in the service. Some things never change, it seems. It's no secret that Schwarzkopf was a volcanic individual with a short fuse, but a lot of his blowups were pretty much deserved by the people to whom he directed his wrath, for various reasons.

Horner never really locked horns with Stormin' Norman, mainly because Horner told him the truth each time and never made anything up, whether it was good news or bad news. If it was bad news, Horner would recommend ways to make things better, and generally things would improve.


This book isn't a quick read because of its length--a shade under 550 pages--but it was No. 1 on the *New York Times*' Best Sellers list, and it generally has something for most all military enthusiasts. It delves into the inner structures and politics of various factions of the incredibly complex military machine and war plans, but there are plenty of in-the-cockpit flying stories as well.
