










At the meeting we had two new visitors. Ryan Colt and Mike Kinowski who brought in 4 of his models. We thank them for coming and hope they will join us as regulars!

TIPS & TRICKS

Here is a tip sent in by Carl Knable on making Decals.

I am using Tango Papa decal film (tangopapadecals.com). The process starts with putting together the lettering/numbers and graphics (nose art, etc.) at double the size needed for the model using my PC and Word. The data is then printed at the double size on my ink jet printer using the best print setting and quality white paper. Then, I take the print and decal paper to my local print shop (Alpha Graphics) and have them do a 50 percent reduction of my original and print it on the decal paper using their color laser printer at \$1.00 per sheet. When I get home, the printed decal sheet gets a coat of clear lacquer to "set" the decals.

MAILBAG

With the announcement that Draxtar Games is closing, I really started to think about the future of our hobby. I ask myself, "Are we our own worst enemy?" So how can we expect local hobby shops to survive if we spend all our time shopping for kits on the internet? The internet is a wonderful thing. It has brought the world closer together and has allowed the hobbyist an avenue to locate those hard to find kits. I am just as guilty as the next guy. Recently, I found a Hasegawa 1/48 scale F-2 on Amazon at a reasonable price (about half of the usual price of \$40). Although the seller was in Japan, all it took was a few clicks of my mouse, prime shipping and the kit was sitting on my doorstep in less than two weeks. A few years ago, I purchased the Academy T-50 in the South Korean Air Force Black Eagles markings. Again, just a few clicks of my mouse and I had the kit in no time at all. On the other hand, if I purchase something from our northern neighbour, Canada, I usually wait close to a month for the item to arrive. So go figure, I buy something on the other side of the world and it arrives quickly but a few hundred miles north....and I have to wait over a month. But that's a topic for another time.

I clearly recall as a kid walking into *Satellite Hobbies* in Alhambra, CA with my brother. We would go there any time we had money burning holes in our pockets and when one of our parents could take us. The store was always filled with everything two boys would want – plastic models, balsa wood planes, matchbox cars, paint, brushes, model rockets etc. A recent internet search showed the store to be gone. Last year I was in Groton. CT and found *Lee's Toys and Hobbies*. I remember the first time I walked through that door I was transported back to my childhood. All that was missing was my brother telling me to hurry up and pick something out. I picked out a few items and when I was checking out, I struck up a conversation with the owner, who I believe was either the second or third generation owner of the store. I saw a newspaper clipping that spoke about the long-time business in Groton and mentioned that due to due to declining sales; he wasn't sure how much longer the doors would remain open.

Is all this nothing more than memories from a bygone era? Am I just living in the past? Where do we draw the line of supporting our local hobby shop (if there are any left) and getting that bargain? Let's face it, online shopping is no longer the wave of the future it is now ingrained in our society. Folks are even buying their groceries online. Yes I have seen kits in the store for \$40 and online for less than \$35. So it is hard not to simply click my mouse and order it.

My 2 cents

I was mulling over Hectors comments at the meeting and this is my take on it.

Growing up, (60 years ago) plastic model kits were everywhere. Hobby shops, dime stores, corner groceries, even the hardware store stocked models. The market, along with the customers, then began to shrink to specialty "hobby" stores, eventually leading to "mail" order and finally to Online retailing.

Some of that was caused by more options for play such as sports, RC toys, model RR, and computer gaming.

Another factor was cost. In 1959 I swooned over a monogram 1/48 kit of the F4F wildcat (with folding wings!). I bought it or I badgered my Mom into it, for \$1. I could barely afford it then. That would amount to \$8.52 today. At hobby lobby the cheapest kits starts at \$12 with most upwards of \$18. Even with the 40% off coupon that's more than the "good old days". If you look at the full range of kits, were talking much, much more, not to mention, paints, materials, and add-on components.

These kits are expensive to buy and to stock, so a local store will always be limited in inventory compared to an online shop not to mention pricing. I think there will always be hobby shops around, but there will be far fewer, and they will be based around dedicated <u>local</u> interest groups, like model RR, RC and with plastic as a much smaller subset.

Perhaps the future really lies with a shop that evolves out of the Maker movement. A "Hobby" shop where you can not only go to buy a kit, but also to MAKE your model or parts, using, laser cutters, 3D printers, and printing your custom decals. Technology is increasingly lowering the cost of the machines so that small shops can now afford them (look at your local library). With classes for how to design and run the machines or simply providing the service, I it would be a way to get young "modellers", of any persuasion, involved.

Whatever the future holds, we need to embrace it and make it work to our advantage. There no going back! Stan Kurcz
