The kit is austere, so there is a lot of extra work in it. Oh, I am doing well so far.

Carl Knable: Airfix B-25C, Italeri C-47, and three Monogram F8F Bearcats.

All 1/72nd scale, and pretty much OOB, except for vac canopies on the Bearcats.













Mike Ferguson: The truck is a modified Dodge A100, and the car is a 1960 Chevrolet Impala. The truck was used around NAS Oceana as a utility hack. Each squadron had one on loan from the base. We called it a "lowboy" but it may have had a military designation.





Bill Vinikour: One model I am working on is a Cthulhu figure based on the H.P. Lovecraft's "Call of the Cthulhu." This solid resin model, produced by Hiroto Tsubouchi, stands almost 22" tall. No scale is provided – allowing one to decide that for themselves. The kit has amazing detail, including a stony skin. To fill major gaps, I first made dozens of various sized round and flat "stones" that matched the size of those on the skin using Apoxie Sculpt. I then filled the gaps with Apoxie Sculpt to which I pressed in the pre-made stones. This effectively matched the existing skin texture. I am in the process of painting many of the "thousands" of stones. So far I have used over 20 colors on these stones. The tentacles, wings, hands, feet, tail end, and bulbous skin (on the head and chest) are painted with acrylic inks (antelope brown, burnt umber, and sepia). So far, the claws have only been primed. The photos show my current progress.

Another project is a Baryonyx kit from Cretaceous Creations. This is a 1/15 scale model that measures about 2-feet long. It comes with a base and a prehistoric amphibian victim. I have essentially finished the dinosaur and amphibian. They were painted with acrylic inks and paints. I will be doing scenery at some point in the near future.












Bob Frysztak: Fighting platform for main mast and one of the many yardarms I am working on for the USS Constitution. Everything is made from scratch. Brass cut from a sheet. Eyelets are turned wire (hobby store jewelry aisle).



Stan Kurcz: This is an academy 1/72 A-10A in one of the four JAWS experimental camouflage schemes from the '70's. I've wanted to make one from the first I saw it. The kit is excellent. Color matching was difficult as Dana Bells FS callouts did not match any photos from his article or internet pics. So, I did the best I could mixing & matching the various shades. May not be exact but it captures the look!





Steve Day: Man, I've been building nothing but model real estate and weathering train cars for my customers! But it's big fun!!! I can't wait till it's safe to get back to doing things out and about!!!












Ihor Hlohowskyj: Seeing as the July meeting theme was to be 'North Africa – WW II' and was my suggestion, here is my currently completed North Africa – WW II armor, all 1/35. German armor builds include: Panzer IV Ausf D (Dragon); Panzer II Ausf F/G (the 1971 Tamiya); Marder II, with added radio set and appropriate cabling and headphones (Dragon); and a Flak 88 with photoetch detailing (1972 Tamiya). British armor includes the M3 Stuart Honey, painted in more correct 3-color cameo (2002 Academy); Matilda II in 3-color caunter scheme (1973 Tamiya kit); M3 Grant (Academy, with corrected suspension and tissue paper tarps); M4 'EI Alamein' Sherman in 'desert pink' (Dragon); and Long Range Desert Group Chevy 30 CTW command car redone as 'Scorpion' extensively modified with added stowage (Tamiya).

Character is Destiny

Lieutenant Commander Butch O'Hare was a fighter pilot assigned to an aircraft carrier Lexington in the South Pacific.

One day his entire squadron was sent on a mission. After he was airborne, he looked at his fuel gauge and realized that someone had forgotten to top off his fuel tank. He would not have enough fuel to complete his mission and get back to his ship. His flight leader told him to return to the carrier. Reluctantly he dropped out of formation and headed back to the fleet. As he was returning to the mothership, he saw something that turned his blood cold. A squadron of Japanese bombers were speeding their way toward the American fleet. The American fighters were gone on a sortie and the fleet was all but defenseless. He couldn't reach his squadron and bring them back in time to save the fleet. Nor could he warn the fleet of the approaching danger. There was only one thing to do. He must somehow divert them from the fleet.

Laying aside all thoughts of personal safety, he dove into the formation of Japanese planes. Wing-mounted .50 calibers blazed as he charged in, attacking one surprised enemy plane and then another. Butch weaved in and out of the now broken formation and fired at as many planes as possible until finally all his ammunition was spent. Undaunted, he continued the assault. He dove at the planes, trying to at least clip off a wing or tail, in hopes of damaging as many enemy planes as possible and rendering them unfit to fly. He was desperate to do anything he could to keep them from reaching the American ships. Finally, the exasperated Japanese squadron took off in another direction. Deeply relieved, Butch O'Hare and his tattered fighter limped back to the carrier. Upon arrival he reported in and related the events surrounding his return. The film from the camera mounted on his plane told the tale. It showed the extent of Butch's daring attempt to protect his fleet. He had destroyed five enemy bombers. That was on February 20, 1942, and for that action he became the Navy's first Ace of WWII and the first Naval Aviator to win the Congressional Medal of Honor. A year later he was killed in aerial combat at the age of 29. His home town would not allow the memory of that heroic action to die. And today, O'Hare Airport in Chicago is named in tribute to the courage of this great man. So the next time you're in O'Hare visit his memorial with his statue and Medal of Honor. It is located between terminal 1 and 2.

Some years earlier there was a man in Chicago called Easy Eddie. At that time, Al Capone virtually owned the city. Capone wasn't famous for anything heroic. His exploits were anything but praiseworthy. He was, however, notorious for enmeshing the city of Chicago in everything from bootlegged booze and prostitution to murder. Easy Eddie was Capone's lawyer and for a good reason. He was very good! In fact, his skill at legal maneuvering kept Big Al out of jail for a long time. To show his appreciation, Capone paid him very well. Not only was the money big: Eddie got special dividends. For instance, he and his family occupied a fenced-in mansion with live-in help and all of the conveniences of the day. The estate was so large that it filled an entire Chicago city block. Yes, Eddie lived the high life of the Chicago mob and gave little consideration to the atrocity that went on around him. Eddy did have one soft spot, however. He had a son that he loved dearly. Eddy saw to it that his young son had the best of everything; clothes, cars, and a good education. Nothing was withheld. Price was no object. And, despite his involvement with organized crime, Eddie even tried to teach him right from wrong. Yes, Eddie tried to teach his son to rise above his own sordid life. He wanted him to be a better man than he was. Yet, with all his wealth and influence, there were two things that Eddie couldn't give his son. Two things that Eddie sacrificed to the Capone mob that he could not pass on to his beloved son: a good name and a good example.

One day, Easy Eddie reached a difficult decision. Offering his son a good name was far more important than all the riches he could lavish on him. He had to rectify all the wrong that he had done. He would go to the authorities and tell the truth about Scar-Face Al Capone. He would try to clean up his tarnished name and offer his son some semblance of integrity. To do this he must testify against The Mob, and he knew that the cost would be great. But more than anything, he wanted to be an example to his son. He wanted to do his best to make restoration and hopefully have a good name to leave his son. So, he testified. Within the year, Easy Eddie's life ended in a blaze of gunfire on a lonely Chicago street. He had given his son the greatest gift he had to offer at the greatest price he would ever pay.

I know what you're thinking.

What do these two stories have to do with one another?

Well, you see, Butch O'Hare was Easy Eddie's son.
